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Ashland Coal and Iron Railroad Office (142), 1100 Front Street. Industrial Building, late 19th century.

Description:

Unlike the A.C. and I. company store, the slightly earlier office is a square twostory brick building with a deck-on-hip roof. Four chimneyspierce the roof at the edge of the deck. Facing the railroad tracks, the facade has a symmetrical fivebay fenestration. The block is embellished with sandstone quoins on the facade, sandstone window hoods and watertable course, and a wooden cornice. The hoods and cornice are simple bracketed Italianate details.

#### Significance:

In its scale and use of expensive masonry materials, the A.C. and I. office shares the affluent guise of the nearby company store. However, the office building was designed to give a calmer, more ordered appearance than the picturesque store building. Together, the two buildings are the only material survival of Ashland's major turn-of-the-century industry. The office building has recently been adapted to house new office space.
