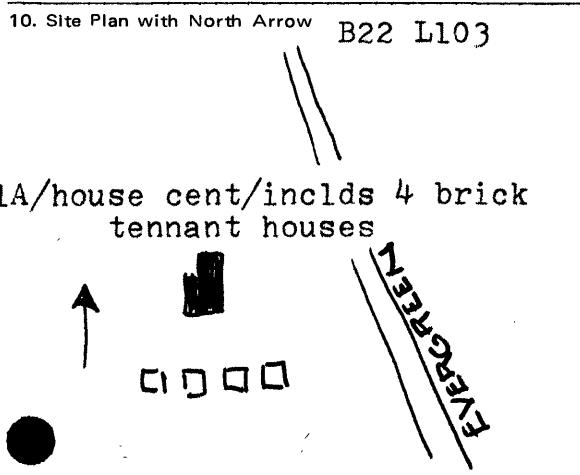

18. Description
The Anchorage is a brick two and one-half story structure with steep gables. The facade is highlighted with bay windows on the first story and rectangular windows on the second story topped by large hoods supported by brackets. Bargeboard and other decorative wood trim enhance the house. Paired chimneys are spaced in the center of the main block. (SEE NEXT PAGE)

19. History
The structure was built in 1868-69 by W.D. Evans, a contractor for James Goslee a retired river-boat captain. The name of the house "The Anchorage" is the source from which the town received its name. Goslee kept an expense account and diary when the house was being built, however the architect is unknown. 20. Significance
The Anchorage is a significant example of the Gothic Revival style proclaimed by A.J. Downing in the mid-nineteenth century. The structure also gave its name to the town. It is an intact house with outbuildings in a picturesque setting symbolizing the town of Anchorage.

The interior has walnut and mahogany woodwork and light marble fireplaces. There is an octagonal dining room and a unique small bathroom whose walls are warmed by the back of four fireplaces. Much of the original farm has been sold, but the ground immediately surrounding the house is intact with its original landscaping. Four brick outbuildings remain in excellent condition.
