4/27/84 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The San Diego Post Office is a large Starved Classical building, located just outside of the present-day downtown area of San Diego. The building has a symmetrical facade and floor plan, and is constructed of reinforced concrete. The front elevation is characterized by window openings extending through the second floor, and separated by fluted piers. Entrance to the public lobby is by two projecting wings. Four low-relief sculptural panels by Archibald Garner are placed on the front elevation.

LOCAL CONTEXT

The Donwtown Station is located near San Diego's central business district; new office construction has been focused to the north, and buildings dating from the 1930s surround the post office on the south and west. Though this part of San Diego has been platted since the 1870s, the Downtown Station is not within a designated historic district.

PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The public lobby occupies the northern portion of the first floor, and has limestone pilasters and a marble floor. Several of the original black-glass lobby desks remain in use, and many of the orginial bronze post office boxes are still in place. Doors facing the lobby are covered with polished brass plates.

The building has a structural steel skeleton, and reinforced concrete walls. The foundation is reinforced poured concrete, and the structure is topped with a flat, asphaltcomposition roof. The lobby has a limestone wainscotting and limestone pilasters, and a terrazzo floor. Doors opening into the lobby have a polished bronze veneer, and the original railings and door moldings are also polished bronze. The original lobby desks, which are still in place, have one-inch thick black glass tops, and square, fluted bronze pedestals.

The San Diego Downtown Station is an example of the "Starved Classicism" that became the characteristic idiom of the WPA architecture. Through the influence of the late phase of Beaux-Arts classicism, ornament is reduced to a bare minimum. The concrete pilasters on the front elevation are fluted to resemble classical pilasters flanking each door. Terracotta panels, sculpted by Archibald Garner, depicting a train, a ship, an airplane, and a car, are placed over the windows at the front entrance. An inscription placed in the frieze carried by the pilasters of the front elevation reads, "Through science and the toil of patient men, the nation's thoughts traverse the land, sea, and air".

ALTERATIONS

An automatic-opening aluminum and glass door was installed on the south entrance when an access ramp for the handicapped was constructed in the early 1970s. The orginial lobby light fixtures have been replaced with mercury-vapor lights, and the registry area has been filled with two banks of lockboxes. The assistant postmaster's office and the postmaster's office have been removed, and replaced with additional lockboxes. The site is landscaped with palm trees and a strip of lawn on the north.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The San Diego Main Post Office retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. It is significant on the state level and exceptionally significant on the local level, under National Register Criterion C, as a distinctive example of a type, period and method of construction.

ARCHITECTURE

Johnson was a well known. San Diego architect, and received several important commissions in the San Diego area in the 1920s through the 1940s. His first major project was the U.S. Exhibition Hall (later the U.S. Consulate) constructed for the 1928 American-Iberian Exposition in Seville, Spain. These buildings were archetypic of the Southern California version of the Spanish Colonial Revival, a style in which most of Johnson's work was designed. In addition to the post office, he collaborated with a team of architects on the San Diego City and County Building, constructed in 1938 with WPA funding.

Johnson described the building's style as "a kind of classic", perhaps revealing an ambivalence about the style. The Starved Classicism of the San Diego Main Office was almost de rigueur for large post offices in the mid-thirties. This building is an example of an architect known for his devotion to the Spanish Colonial Revival who adopted the Starved Classicism of the Supervising Architect's office for one project. This building is unique in the architect's oeuvre. The building has significance on the state level as one of the earliest and largest Starved Classical buildings. On the local level, it is exceptionally important as a relatively rare survivor from the thirties in San Diego's downtown area, thus giving historical focus and a sense of place to its immediate surroundings. The building embodies the fine craftsmanship characteristic of Depression-era public buildings. Its structural sturdiness is also typical of federal building of the period, though a combined structural steel skeleton and heavily reinforced bearing wall construction was found in relatively few projects.

SCULPTURE

The sculpted relief panels on the front elevation are representative of federallysponsored art in general and of Garner's work in particluar. The panels lack distinction as art, but combined with the building's architecture, contribute to the overall significance of the building. The panels also have local significance; though several federally-sponsored murals exist in San Diego, the post office reliefs are the only known federally-sponsored sculpture in the city.

Archibald Garner, Sculptor, (1904-1970):

Garner received his art education at the California School of Fine Arts (now the San Francisco Art Institute), and was a pupil of Ralph Stackpole and Ruth Craveth. He was a sculpture designer for 20th Century Fox Studios in Los Angeles, and taught at Occidental College in Eagle Rock. He received several commissions for federal art projects, among them "Astronomer's Monument", at the Griffith Park Planetarium, Los Angeles; "Law", an eight-foot limestone relief in the Los Angeles Federal Building lobby; "Law", a red sandstone relief in the Los Angeles Museum of History, Science and Art; a large wood relief in the Inglewood Post Office; and "Justice", a concrete relief in the Fresno Post Office.
