Monestead LEBOVICH The Alfred Buffat homestead is one of the few pre-Civil War (frame structures) left in Knox County. The home is set among large red-leaf maples in a still fairly undeveloped portion of the County. It is presently unoccupied and has deteriorated somewhat since the last occupant left some eight years ago. However, the property has been recently purchased by John Parker, a direct descendent of Buffat, and restoration plans are being considered.

Originally built as a simple one-story 4-room and hall structure in 1867, the house was expanded to two stories three years later. The porticoes were also added at that time.

The house, known as "The Maples," was the center of community life until the turn of the century. This was primarily because of the mill Buffat owned. The cottage next to the house was built for the miller and his family and was constructed about the same time as the house. The cottage is also of frame construction and both the house and cottage have yellow poplar siding. Lumber for the community's houses was cut from the Buffat farm, sawed into timbers and boards at the Buffat mill and the structures assembled by neighbors and friends. The interiors of the cottage and house have soft pine flooring and both had plastered walls and ceilings. The plaster has deteriorated through the years and will probably be replaced by drywall in restoration.

The granary, blacksmith shop, wagon scales, springhouse, one-room schoolhouse, and mill have either fallen or been torn down. The stone pillars which supported the mill wheel as well as the raceway remain. Several of the grindstones are in the possession of Mr. Parker.

Besides the main house and the miller's cottage, other buildings of the farm-mill complex still standing are the smokehouse, washhouse, barns, and utility buildings.

Alfred Buffat (1840-1908) came to Knox County at the age of 10 with his parents from Switzerland in search of religious tolerance and economic opportunity.

In 1851 the watermilling enterprise was started to supplement the Buffat's farm income. During the Civil War the mill was in possession of both Confederate and Federal troops. According to Alfred Buffat's memoirs the mill at one time was the largest gristmill south of the Ohio River.

In 1859 Alfred Buffat took over the mill from his father and eight years later started to build "The Maples" for his bride, the daughter of a Swiss consul.

By this time the Buffat Mill and home with its attendent facilities were the center of community life. Alfred and his father, Pierre, taught in the one-room schoolhouse on land donated by P. Buffat. (Pierre Buffat had been a university professor before immigrating from Switzerland.) The Buffat community, known as Spring Place, also was one of the major grist mills in the county and supplied much of the area with cut timber from the wood mill. The Buffats also ran a blacksmith shop as well as farming several hundred acres. A road was built to Knoxville, still called Buffat Mill Road, for the express purpose of transporting the goods manufactured by the Buffats to Knoxville.

The major significance of the home and remaining buildings is that it is one of only a few visual reminders of the influence the Swiss had in the area, and the industries which they established to carry on their way of life.

### ALFRED BUFFAT HOMESTEAD

Request for determination of boundaries:

On December 30, 1974, a nomination for this property was submitted to the National Register. The approximate acreage of the nominated property was listed as 9.5 acres, with the latitude and longitude coordinates of only one point shown. The listing of 9.5 acres appears to have been somewhat arbitrary, and the boundaries of the nominated property undefined.

There are currently in progress plans for the construction of Tennessee Highway Project I-640 in the area, with the proposed right-of-way being located a considerable distance back of the house. A Section 106 meeting was held at the site, and a Memorandum of Agreement has been executed in which procedures for mitigating the adverse effect of the project have been agreed upon.

Inasmuch as the boundaries of the Buffat Homestead property are currently undefined, it is requested that the boundaries for the property as shown on the enclosed map be accepted and that the acreage be reduced to approximately 7.97 acres. The property west of this proposed tract is a wooded hillside area, and has no significance relating to the Buffat settlement. There are no buildings located on this property, nor were there ever any known to exist there. It is my opinion that all of the known resources relating to the Buffat settlement are included within the proposed revised boundaries.
