DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

On the east bank of the Pocomoke River approximately six miles southwest of Pocomoke City off Cedarhall Wharf Road stands Beverly, a Georgian style house. Two stories plus an attic, Beverly is five bays wide by three deep. The west or river facade has a central door surmounted by a small, heavy fanlight with a gauged brick arch. Directly above the door is a narrow Palladian-style window with narrow shutters. On both the first and second stories of each remaining bay is a 12 over 12 window. The first story windows have finepanel shutters while those on the second have louvered shutters. The flat arches above the windows are of gauged brick. The rose-colored brick is laid in Flemish bond. Encircling the house between the first and second stories is a three-course belt of rubbed brick. Along the roof is a heavy modillion cornice with a dentil frieze. The house sits on a brick foundation laid in Flemish bond and has a molded brick water-The steps leading to the door have wrought iron railings table. and a delicate, wrought iron arch.

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Covering the three center bays of the east facade is a two-story, pedimented portico. There are plain, square corner columns while the two center ones are fluted Greek ionic columns. The cornice treatment on the pediment is identical to that on the house.

The north end has a nine over nine light window in each of the three bays on the first and second stories. One four over four light window is centered in the gable.

There is an inside gable end chimney on both the north and south ends.

The south end has a single nine over nine light window on the first and second stories of the west bay. In the gable are 3 four over four light windows. Extending from the center and east bays is a one-story hyphen of beaded clapboard connected to a two-story plus attic wing.

The wing adjoining Beverly on the south is two bays wide by two deep. On the south end there is a door in the east bay and a narrow, nine over six light window in the west bay. The two bays on the second floor each have a nine over six light window. In the gable, flanking the inside end chimney, are 2 four over two sash windows. This wing is covered with beaded clapboard.

Beverly has six rooms on its first floor. In the center are two separate halls. The exterior door in the east facade opens into one hall and the door in the river facade opens into the other, which is the stair hall. There are two rooms flanking

The northwest room is completely paneled. The fireplace centered on the north wall has a rectangular opening surrounded by a plain, black marble architrave in the center of which is a white marble keystone. Fluted pilasters with full entablature in ressaut frame the chimney breast. Flanking the fireplace are two closets with four-panel doors and H-L hinges.

The size and elegance of Beverly on the Pocomoke in Worcester County, a Georgian mansion of 1770's date, reflects the prominent position held in the county by its builders, Littleton Dennis and his wife, Susanna Upshur Dennis. It is larger than the average house of the period in this county and it is more formal, exhibiting a local adaptation of the high style of the time. The original paneling and woodwork, which shows characteristics of both the early and late Georgian periods as well as a few Federal touches, is still retained in the house. An ice house, uncommon by its circular shape, survives to the northwest. It is original to the house.

Littleton Dennis (1728-1774), a successful lawyer, began the construction of Beverly probably in the late 1760's or early 1770's. After his death, the house was reputedly completed by his wife Susanna.¹ In Dennis's will, dated 1768 and probated in 1774, he devised "unto my son John Dennis . all the lands whereon I live with the land thereunto adjoining except the marsh land "2 His wife was made the executor of his estate. The inventory of his goods and chattels taken in August of 1774 showed Dennis to be an extremely wealthy man. In addition to Beverly, called the Manor, he owned four other properties: the Mill Plantation, the Swamp Plantation, Caldegut Plantation, and the Sea Side Plantation. He had fifty-one slaves at Beverly and the total worth of his personal property came to £9598,16,11, exclusive of approximately $\pm 2,000$ worth of debts owed to him.³

8. SIGNIFICANCE, continued

John took possession of the lands in Accomack and Worcester Counties except for a "piece of marsh" in the latter, and Little-ton took possession of that marsh and all the land in Somerset County. Their father did not leave a will so the lands left to his sons are never listed specifically.

John Upshur Dennig, who by the deed of partition would have received Beverly, ⁷ was a successful planter and merchant. He exported cypress staves to the West Indies in his own ships and imported cargoes of molasses.⁸ At his death in 1851, he owned five farms in Virginia and Worcester County, a mill, and a blacksmith shop. He had 159 slaves of which fifty, the largest number at any single place, were at Beverly.⁹

In his will, probated in 1851, John Upshur Dennis left his "plantation whereon I live called Dennis' Union and Williams Desire" jointly to his sons Samuel King Dennis and Arthur Emmerson Dennis after the death of their mother Louisa.¹⁰ The house descended at about the turn of the 19th century to Samuel King Dennis' five sons. He was a member of the State legislature for several years and several of his sons also held prominent positions in politics and the law in Maryland. Beverly was sold out of the Dennis family in 1927.
