expressions of the Neo-classic style. Completed in 1922, the four story building was designed by Atlanta architect Ten Eyck Brown in association with Marr and Holman. The exterior is virtually unaltered with the Third Avenue facade displaying a massive pedimented portico with Ionic columns. This facade is sheathed in limestone blocks while the remainder of the building is of brick construction. Recessed within the portico is the double bronze door entrance. This entrance features a classical surround and the facade displays a belt course with wave molding and a Greek fret band. Windows are multilight fixed casement and one-over-one sash. Some interior remodeling has taken place but the original marble floors and decorative woodwork is intact.

IGNIFICANCE

Completed in 1922, the Nashville Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank is both architecturally and historically significant. Designed by Atlanta architect Ten Eyck Brown and Marr and Holman, the building is one of the city's best examples of the Neo-Classic style. Erected by the Federal Reserve, the building was authorized in response to Nashville's growth as a financial center in the early 20th century. The building was located in the city's "Wall Street" area known for its concentration of financial institutions along Third Avenue and Union Street. The building was dedicated (continued)

on December 21, 1922 and its design mirrored neighboring Neo-Classic style bank buildings. The design is a fine example of its style with a large pediment and Ionic collonade. The exterior is unaltered and retains its original design. The Federal Reserve occupied the building until 1958 when it moved to a new structure on Eighth Avenue, North. The original building has since been utilized as financial offices for private institutions.
