DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Southern Bell Telephone Company Building, erected in the modernistic style in 1929, has the appearance of having been chopped from a single block of material. While both vertical and horizontal additions have been added over the years, the present building is only about half as tall as the structure originally planned by the architects, Marye, Alger and Vinour. The original sketches of the structure depict a tall building, of some twenty-five stories, with many setbacks stepping back from a wide lower section to a central tower at the top. The building as it stands today is fourteen stories high.

"As in any design which has, in effect, been cut off at the middle, the Southern Bell Building appears truncated and imcomplete." A massive solid in form, the Bell Building has little or no facade articulation with the exception of that provided by the window openings themselves and a sparingly used, incised or low relief ornamentation around the windows and main entrance; today, this decoration can still be seen at the base and around the windows of the fourteenth floor. This ornamentation, often geometric in character, is best seen in the Southern Bell Building around the main entrance arch on Ivy Street. Here, a two-story high corbelled arch entrance cuts through the flat plane of the front of the building to reveal, recessed into the building's base, a pair of bronze double doors. Around the entrance are numerous low relief ornaments ranging from stylistic representations of animals and people to simple geometric patterns. All of the decoration has been executed in such a manner as to emphasize verticality, a quality normally stressed in this style of building.

The exterior of the Southern Bell Building is sheathed in limestone and almost has the appearance of concrete from a distance. The roof of the building is now occupied almost completely by telephonic communications equipment.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Southern Bell Telephone Company Building in Atlanta is significant as the only good example in Atlanta of the <u>modernistic</u> style. Designed in 1927-1928 by Marye, Alger and Vinour, this building was "one of Atlanta's first 'really modernistic structures' according to Elinor Hillyer, writing in the Atlanta Journal Magazine on February 16, 1930. She also called it 'a pioneer of the strictly modern manner' and a striking contrast to the 'manifold oriental splendors of the Shrine Mosque and Fox Theatre' which had just been finished" by the same architectural firm.

The present building, although added on to over the years, both horizontally and vertically, is only about half as tall as the building originally planned by Oliver Vinour, who designed the exterior, and P. Thornton Marye. The architect's original rendering "depicted a tall building with many setbacks stepping back from a wide lower section to a central tower at the top. The original building (1929) was six stories high; following additions in 1947, 1948, and 1963, the building reached fourteen stories, the present height. The architect's original sketches show a structure twenty-five stories in height." The massing of the structure successively "stepping back" at succeedingly higher levels, was meant to produce a pyramidal effect.

True to most business and communications facilities of the time, the original concept of the Southern Bell Building was to provide working space for the employeen engaged in a variety of tasks as well as room for some telephone equipment. Originally, ten floors of heavy equipment and fifteen floors of office space were planned for the building. The structure today is occupied primarily by electronic equipment, not people as intended. The roof is also occupied by transmitting devices. The result is that, due to the increased loads imposed on the structure and foundations by the "change of occupancy", it is extremely doubtful that the architect's original plan for a soaring tower will ever be realized. The footings of the building will simply not support any additional weight.

While the present building has been enlarged several times, with each addition attempting to follow the architect's original scheme and thus slowly but surely working towards the completion of the initial building concept, the proposed structure according to J. A. Finch, a local architect, "would probably have never been any more satisfactory than the present building." However, Harold Bush-Brown, Director of the School of Architecture at Georgia Tech at the time the Bell Building

was erected, called the structure "an architecture expressive of our own civilization..." and went on to say that the building was typical of the modernistic school.

Later additions, especially the new equipment tower on the top, constitute intrusions to the original design. In spite of these features, this building is the only fully typical, extant Atlanta example of the modernistic style. Both the finely incised ornament and the pyramidal form are unique to the city and as such contribute to needed visual rarity downtown.

The only good extant example in Atlanta of the modernistic style, and the only extant example of the "pyramidal" approach to building form in the city, the Southern Bell Telephone Company Building has long been and will continue to be a landmark in Atlanta.
