#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This is a raised cottage (c. 1840-45) with a brick ground floor, stuccoed and scored, and a frame upper floor. A shallow front gatllery (less than 7' deep) has flat paneled supports, brackets at the top and cut-out railings between. A plain wood parapet rises above the flat roof. A central flight of stairs leads from the front walk to the upper floor of the gallery. The configuration of the stairs had been altered in the 1940s and was returned to resemble its original appearance in 1977.

The trim for the full length windows and the door of the facade, the louvered lozenge panels above them, and the gallery date from a late 19th c. (c. 1880) remodeling.

The house is two rooms deep. Two rooms, 19' x 21', flank the 10' wide entrance hall, and two 17' x 18' rooms are located to either side of the 17' wide rear hall. This hall is not as deep as the rooms it bisects, allowing a small recessed space on the rear gallery. Ceilings are 14'9" tall. Interior changes that date after 1900 include the removal of partitions between the two parts of the hall, the altering of the stair (which originally continued straight) to the basement, the addition of a sunroom (c.1910) and some interior details. The current owner renovated the house in 1977 and replaced the c. 1880 cast iron mantels in the front rooms, added some new moldings, and created a kitchen and bath (see attached plan with notes).

The house has one of the best collections of 19th century outbuildings in Eutaw. They are probably post Civil War, dating from the period of the remodelings. A pair of small matching square storehouses is at the rear of the residence. A large similar storehouse and a little hexagonal well shelter are to the south side of the house. The well pavillion has arched openings in the latticework to each facade. The others are clapboarded below. The large example has slats of two sizes above, separated by a horizontal band with serrated lower edge. All have bracketed cornices and hipped roofs with spires at the apex. A two-room servants house is also on the property.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

<u>ARCHITECTURE</u>: The Pierce House is locally significant as one of two raised cottages in Eutaw which were developed from prototypes on the Carolina seaboard and transplanted into the Black Belt of Alabama. In spite of detail changes, the form of the building remains intact and reflects the strong preference of the original owner to duplicate the houses in the area he came from. The house also reflects the rare occurance in the area of applied Italianate detailing. Although houses in the larger towns were updated with Italinanate details in the decade just prior to the Civil War, few such structures exist in Greene County. The detailing is of very high quality and workmanship. Additionally, the house has one of the best collections of 19th century outbuildings in Eutaw.

William F. Pierce purchased the lot on which this house was constructed for \$750 from Asa White on May 25, 1839. He was listed in the city directory of 1855 as a planter and a lawyer and is presumed to have constructed the house prior to 1845. In 1879 his heirs sold the property to John T. Brodnax. It was most likely Brodnax who had the Italianate detailing applied. The house was sold again, in 1900, to Marguerite P. Meredith.
