

18. Description This is a two-story neo-Colonial style house in frame with a symmetrical facade, a hipped roof and interior chimneys. The entrance door has sidelights and an elliptical fanlight with fine molding. A porch spans the facade. Dentil moldings decorate the cornice of the house and porch.			
19. History The house was built for H.D. Hausgen who was Anchorage Postmaster and was part owner of the Hausgen and Fuller General Store which stood on the site of the present Anchorage Post Office. He was the local pharmacist and taught at the Louisville School of Pharmacy. The house was built by the local master-builder William B. Wood about 1898.			
20. Significance This house is a significant example of the Neo-Colonial style at the turn-of-the-century. It was built by Wm. B. Wood who was responsible for numerous structures in the area most of which were in the Neo-Colonial style.

Description

Since its completion around 1898, this house has remained intact, with no known changes made in its colonial Revival styling.

Significance

Like numerous other structures in the Anchorage area, the Hausgen house represents the work of William B. Wood, a prominent local builder and contractor. Wood did much to popularize the Colonial Revival style in this section of Jefferson County, and the influence of this trend is demonstrated by the hipped roof, symmetrical facade, and the one-story veranda with Tuscan-Doric columns. These features are typical of Wood's Neo-Colonial residences. However, the elliptical fanlight and fine dentil moldings of the porch and cornice make the Hausgen house a particularly fine example of his work. In addition, upon comparison this dwelling seems to have greatly influenced the 1908 design of the W.S. Forrester house (JF600) - a residence attributed to Henry Frank, a local builder who had early served as an apprentice to Wood.

Boundary Description

The boundary of the Hausgen house site is shown as a red line on the attached aerial photo. The nominated site contains approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ acre and includes the house. There are no significant outbuildings. (SCALE: 1" = 200')
