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### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cambridge Meetinghouse is a Federal Style brick structure which employs the traditional New England meetinghouse plan of a gabled front elevation with central entrance and belltower. The projecting central pavilion is a variation common to the Federal period. Wall construction is seven-course American bond brick on a stone foundation. The roof is clad with slate. A molded box cornice extends across the front gable and faces the central pavilion as a pediment with fan louvre. The brick belltower has large rectangular louvres on all four elevations, a molded cornice, and is surmounted by an octagonal domed cupola. The front entrance has slightly recessed panelled double doors, panelled reveals, and is framed by a surround of pilasters supporting an entablature. First-story fenestration uses twenty-over-fifteen sash; the second story has nine-over-six sash. The east elevation side door has a glazed transom.

The Meetinghouse is located on a main street in Jeffersonville, Cambridge's largest village. It substantially retains its original exterior fabric and appearance. The only significant alterations occurred in 1901 when the interior was completely renovated to change the building from a church to a public auditorium. A large Colonial Revival style shed-like projection was added to the rear to accomodate a theatrical stage. A small ell on this addition is visible from the street and is faced with a corniced parapet. All original interior fabric except for window surrounds were removed at that time. In addition, several front elevation window aperatures were bricked in, and two west elevation windows were sympathetically altered to doors with glazed transoms. One of these doors is on the second story and is served by an iron fire escape. The dome may also have been added at this time. Letters reading "Town Meeting Playhouse" were applied to the front pavilion in the 1960's.

### 8 SIGNIFICANCE

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#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cambridge Meetinghouse, also known as the Old Brick Church, is significant as an example of the New England meetinghouse as it developed in Vermont during the Federal period. The gable-front form with central entrance and belltower first emerged in the eighteenth century, and became a virtual standard building type for churches, academies, and town halls from c. 1800 until c. 1875, when the eclecticism of Victorian architecture required less formal proportions. On this particular meetinghouse a pedimented central pavilion and domed cupola are employed to simulate the monumental portico and multi-tiered steeple often found on higher style examples of the period. Other ornamentation includes a fan louvre in the front pediment, a molded cornice, and Neo-Classical entrance surround. It is one of the most significant examples of the Federal style in Lamoille County.

The Cambridge Meetinghouse was erected in 1826 as a Union Church, to be shared by Congregationalists, Baptists, Methodists, and Universalists. This unusually early example of denominational interaction evolved in just a few years into a radical brand of antisectarianism which kept the church, and at times the whole town, in a state of "wild excitement," in which "the regular labors and duties of life were broken up, and in some cases dispensed with altogether. Business was suspended." Known in the early years as Truarism, this religious ferment came to a head in the 1840's when members of the church calling themselves Perfectionists established a free love commune in Cambridge. By 1852, they had moved away, mostly to the famous silver-making commune at Oneida, New York, and the church's revolutionary period ended.

In 1866, the Town of Cambridge began to use the meetinghouse as a town hall; in 1871, the present bell was purchased, and in 1889, the Congregationalists built their own church near the center of the village, marking the last use of the building for religious services. The only significant alterations occurred in 1901, when the interior was completely renovated and a large shed-like projection was added to the rear to accomodate a theatrical stage, and the building was converted to an "opera house." Of the original interior fabric, only molded window surrounds and the gallery frame survived. In 1958, the Town moved its offices out of the vestry, and, except for a brief revival as a summer stock theater in the 1960's, the old meetinghouse has been vacant since.
