Description

The Aday-Stephenson House is a one-and-one-half story, wood frame residence designed in the Plain Traditional style around a double-pen plan with an original ell projecting from the western elevation of the southern pen. This essential floor plan is augmented by a full-width, single-story, shed roof front porch, supported upon four turned wood posts, and by an interior ell, shed roof porch at the western ell intersection, also supported upon a total of three turned wood posts. A single, small brick chimney rises through the gable peak of the ell slightly to the east of center. The walls are fenestrated throughout with individual and paired one-over-one wood sash windows. The metal roof and weatherboarded walls are supported upon a continuous stone foundation.

The eastern or front elevation is symmetrically-composed of two pairs of windows flanking two centrally-placed, separate single-leaf doors, each leading into a pen behind. The other three elevations are similarly-fenestrated, though the inside of the rear ell intersection is punctuated only by two single-leaf doors leading onto the porch.

Also included are a stone cistern and a well, both of which are contributing.

Significance

Criteria C, local significance

Built between the years 1903 and 1905 by John Aday, a local developer who platted this addition to the city of Marshall (hence the name Aday Addition), the Aday-Stephenson House is named for him and for its earliest known residents, Bill and Frances Stephenson, who lived there during the 1920s. Unfortunately, little else is known about the history of this structure, except that it appears to be largely intact and unaltered.

The Aday-Stephenson House was constructed as a residence in Marshall during the first decade of the twentieth century and as such represents the historic context Searcy County History, 1865-1910: Reconstruction, Railroads and Renewal. As noted in this context, this was a period of county-wide growth and prosperity, relatively speaking, and thus a period during which there was much new immigration, and so much new construction. Though a few high-style buildings were constructed during this time of relative prosperity, designs that drew primarily from traditional folk building traditions were far more common, particularly for many of the immigrants arriving from other regions of the United States to work in the local timber-related industries. Recent scholarship has shed new light upon the significance of these traditions and has begun to identify and distinguish specific types within this broad category; among these is the double-pen house, which was also frequently augmented with an adjoining ell, whether original or added later. The Aday-Stephenson House is one of the best examples in Searcy County of this sub-category of traditional American folk housing as its ell appears to be original. As a good and representative example of this regional folk tradition, and thus as a record of how less "architecturally-sophisticated" people built here during this period, it is eligible under Criterion C with local significance.
