

The Thomas Faust House, 69 N.W. 4th Street, contributes to the Historic Resources of Homestead, Florida, multiple property group under property type F.1, Residential Buildings. The onestory house, constructed of frame ca. 1926, has roughly textured, stucco exterior walls. The flat roof of built-up tar and gravel is hidden behind a curved parapet. The concrete block foundation is pierced with ventilation openings.

#### SETTING

The Faust House is located one block west of the Homestead business district. Another residence is located to the east. To the south and west are vacant lots. The lot is landscaped with a variety of trees and shrubs.

#### EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The main (south) facade of the Faust House features a centrally located entrance portico (Photo 1). The entrance door is recessed in an arched opening. The portico has a curvilinear parapet, which echoes the shape of the main parapet above. A stone pineapple-shaped finial tops each side of the porch roof. The portico floor is of inlaid tile.

Triple windows flank the entrance portico. Those to the west of the entrance are 4/1, wood, double hung sash; those on the east side are 1/1, double hung sash. Planters on pedestals are placed on stone slabs in front of the windows.

The parapet is raised in squared projections at the corners of the building. Double hung, 1/1, wood windows grouped in threes, pairs, and singly fenestrate the east wall of the house (Photo 2). Midway along this facade, the parapet rises in a squared projection. An exterior stucco chimney distinguishes the west elevation. The window openings that flank the chimney are filled with glass blocks (Photo 3).

A small enclosed porch is located on the rear (north) elevation (Photo 4). It has a parapet with raised, squared corners, repeating the design of the main parapet above it. Paired windows to the east of the porch are 4/4, double hung sash. All windows throughout the house have stucco sills and all

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are covered with iron security grills (Photo 5). Groups of scuppers are placed above all the windows.

A parapet is found on each corner, in addition to the curved parapet of the main facade. The stucco molding found on the front facade extends around the entire perimeter of the house.

### INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The Faust House retains its original room configurations. Walls throughout the interior are plaster, and simple wood molding frames all the interior doors.

The main entrance on the south facade provides access directly into the living room. The face of the fireplace on the west wall of the living room is covered with a combination of Spanish tile and broken glazed tile (Photos 6 and 7). French doors with elongated glass insets lead from the living room to the dining room (Photo 8). Another set of French doors at the east end of the living room leads to a sun room (Photo 9). This room has a decorative tile floor like that of the entry porch. The tiles are in a primitive green, gold, and white floral pattern. Well-maintained oak flooring is found throughout the rest of the house.

The kitchen is located to the north of the dining room. North of the sun room, down a hallway, are two bedrooms, separated by a bathroom.

### ALTERATIONS/ADDITIONS

Over the years, some of the four-light upper sashes of the windows have been replaced with a single pane. The windows flanking the chimney were replaced with glass blocks after the 1992 hurricane. The present use of the house as an antique shop is compatible with its original use as a residence. There have been no changes to the exterior of the building or to the floor plan.

The Thomas Faust House, at 69 N.W. 4th Street in Homestead, Florida, is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C, at the local level, in the area of architecture. It is an excellent local example of the Mission/Spanish Colonial Revival style. This was the home of Thomas (Tom) Faust, secretary and treasurer of the Fuchs Bakery.

The Faust House contributes to the Historic Resources of Homestead, Florida, multiple property group under historic context II, Incorporation/Boom Time Era, 1913-1926, and under property type F.1, Residential Buildings.

### HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Faust House was constructed ca. 1926 for Tom and Mary Faust. The Fausts moved to Homestead from West Virginia when Tom was offered the position of secretary-treasurer of the Fuchs Baking Company by his brother-in-law Charles Fuchs, Jr. The two families lived side-by-side, sharing a common driveway and a twocar garage. The garage no longer exists. The Fuchs house is still standing, but altered. As an executive of the Fuchs Baking Company, Tom Faust played a significant role in the expansion of this firm into a major business. The company was founded by Charles Fuchs, Sr., in 1913. The Fuchs Bakery was one of the important early businesses in Homestead, and its growth paralleled that of the community. The Fuchs Baking Company operated from Homestead until moving to Miami in 1934. The Faust family lived in this house until the late 1930s, when they moved out of the area.

### ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

Although modest in scale, the Thomas Faust House is a significant local example of the Mission/Spanish Colonial Revival style. This architectural expression gained great popularity in Florida during the Boom years, and continued in favor into the 1930s and 1940s. Many examples of the style in Homestead have been lost to demolition. The overall massing and decorative elements of the Faust house are characteristic of the style. It features a stucco exterior, Mission-style parapet which is echoed in the projecting entrance porch, scuppers, and decorative tile floors and fireplaces. The house, constructed ca. 1926, retains its architectural integrity to a high degree.


