DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Palmer-Perkins House is a 2-1/2 story Classic Revival structure with load-bearing brick foundation and first story walls and wood frame second story walls. The five bay entrance facade has a central two story portico. The house is double pile, central hall in plan with rooms <u>en suite</u> and interior end chimneys. Interior details include mantels with Greek Revival motifs.

The gable roof with shallow eaves has a boxed cornice. In each gable there are two windows between the chimneys. On the first and second stories the gable ends are four bays deep. All windows are six over six double hung sash with plain surrounds and exterior blinds and graduate in size from the largest on the first story to the smallest at the attic level. The windows of the first story have jack arches. The central bay of the main facade is larger to emphasize the doorway. This doorway consists of panelled wood doors with sidelights and glazed transom sash. The second story doorway, giving access to the porch, reflects that of the first floor; however, the transom is omitted.

The central two story pedimented portico provides a covered entry for the first story and a small porch on the second story. The first floor deck is raised on brick piers five steps above grade. The steps and deck are of wood and carry the square wood columns. There is a plain balustrade on the second story level.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Palmer-Perkins House along with Lyndhurst Plantation (N.R., Jefferson County) are the only extant examples in Florida of a construction technique which employed first story load-bearing brick walls and a wood framed second story.

__INVENTION

Martin Palmer came to Jefferson County in the mid-1820s, established himself as a planter, and built for his family a large log house which was used until the present structure was completed about 1836. In addition to his planting interests, Palmer also owned a store and a tavern and served as County Commissioner and trustee of the Jefferson Academy. After his death in 1857, the property devolved on his son Thomas M. Palmer, a local physician, and was later bought by John H. Perkins.

Perkins was a prominent Monticello businessman from the 1880s until the 1920s. In 1889 he was elected vice president of the Monticello Board of Trade and began plans for the Perkins Block, a new brick and cast iron store. Local citizens encouraged him to include an opera house in his design to entertain visiting tourists staying across Washington Street at the St. Elmo Hotel. Public opinion favored an opera house not only for prospective vacationers, but also for the cultural benefit to the local community, and Perkins agreed to include it in his building. As the owner of one of the largest commercial enterprises in town as well as the opera house, Perkins was a community leader and his home a center for the cultural affairs of the town.



ITEM NUMBER 8 PAGE 1

The Greek Revival style which appeared in America in the 1820's is an adaptation of ancient Greek architecture. Initially designs were modeled on the temple form. However, in Florida many liberties were taken with the proportions and details of Classical forms. Because Florida builders "watered down" the precise designs of pattern books, Florida Greek Revival buildings are in large measure vernacular.

This house is a fine example of vernacular composition constructed in North Florida in the early days of the American period. No documentary evidence has come to light to explain "why" this house and Lyndhurst were constructed in this manner. There is also no documentary evidence at this date to indicate that other buildings of this type were ever constructed in North Florida. The remaining houses of distinction of this era and style are frame (see Monticello Historic District (NR) and Wirick-Simmons House(NR)).
