

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The J.C. Jourdan House is a two-story, frame I-House with a one story rear ell to the left and a mix of vernacular Queen Anne and classical detail. (See Photo #1.) A corbelled brick chimney is located on the east elevation. The foundation is brick piers. The infill between piers has been coated with concrete. The house has a shallow front yard on West Eastport, one of two main east-west routes through town.

The facade of the house is three bay (W,D,W). Windows are 2/2 double hung with plain architraves. The entry door is one light over a bevelled wood bottom, and a surround with a one light transom. The first floor porch is full length, supported on Tuscan columns with molded capitals and bases. The porch on the second level is a gable front portico with spindlework detail over cutwork brackets and turned posts and balusters. The base of the porch landing on the first floor porch roof is covered with decorative shingles. A one story, hipped roof bay is located on the west elevation.

On the rear (south) elevation the shed roofed porches were enclosed in 1983 except for the length of the southernmost room. A carport has been added to the west of the ell. Chamfered porch posts with necking and top molding support what's left of the rear porch. An interior chimney is located between the two rear rooms.

The interior was altered somewhat in 1983. The massing was unchanged except for the enclosure of the rear porches. The central hall remains open on both levels, with a quarter-turn stair on the right wall replaced except for the original newel post. The old balusters and rail survive on the second floor landing. Mantels on the second and first floors are original. The most ornate mantel is the cast iron Italianate model in the eastern room downstairs. Two others are of simpler wood construction. Surrounds in the rear ell are original for both windows and doors with transoms. But new, dark-stained surrounds have been installed in the front hall and two front rooms.

The J.C. Jourdan house is significant as the best remaining example of the uncommon I-House form in Iuka.

The

I-House, given Queen Anne porch detailing, illustrates the high point in vernacular architecture during the post-bellum years when Iuka was recognized as a train-accessible resort community. (See Post Bellum Residential Property Type, pp. F 5-7.)


Three examples of the I-House form survive in Iuka, this house (c.1890), the McConville House at Pearl and Eastport (c.1910), and the Carmichael House on West Quitman Street (c.1870), both of which have been significantly altered. The Jourdan house retains its massing, its early porches (Queen Anne upstairs and Free Classic down,) its original chimneys and mantels, and substantial amounts of its interior woodwork. Its exterior is little changed except for porch enclosures at the rear.


Its occupants, the J.C. Jourdan family, arrived from the town of Burnsville sometime after 1880, the 1900 U.S. Census being their first appearance in town. J.C. Jourdan was listed at 30 years old, with his wife, Ada, and one child. His elder brother or uncle J.W. Jourdan, a banker, had also settled in Iuka. The Jourdan family owned several important Iuka businesses, including J.C.'s drugstore, sawmill, and lumberyard, and had a major impact on local business operations in the early 20th century.

The I-House, given Queen Anne porch detailing, illustrates the high point in vernacular architecture during the post-bellum years when Iuka was recognized as a train-accessible resort community. (See Post Bellum Residential Property Type, pp. F 5-7.)

Three examples of the I-House form survive in Iuka, this house, the McConville House at Pearl and Eastport (c.1910), and the Carmichael House on West Quitman Street (c.1870), both of which have been significantly altered.
