Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

The **First United Methodist Church** is a three-bay, gable end, single cell, Gothic Revival, red-brick church constructed about 1850. It is of common bond, on brick foundation; has pointed arch windows and door, buttressed sides, steep-pitched roof, and bell tower (photo #1). It is located in the residential section of Main Street in the town of Louisa, county seat of Lawrence County, and is about three blocks from the courthouse square. Louisa contains some of the earliest buildings in the Big Sandy Area, which was the last area of Kentucky to be settled. Sites previously listed in the National Register in Louisa are the Birthplace of Fred M. Vinson (September 4, 1974), Garred-Burgess House, Chapel and Burial Vault (October 29, 1975), and the Yatesville Covered Bridge (March 26, 1976).

The main entrance of the building is centered in the front facade. The opening is a pointed arch and contains double doors with stained glass above (photo #2). Each gable end contains a large window (photo #5). Trefoils decorate a panel supported by brackets at the apex of the gable (photo #3). The roof is crowned by a Gothic bell tower (said to replace a steeple) containing a prized bell, cast in 1852 by A. Fulton in Pittsburgh. Pointed arch windows flank the entrance doorway.

There are buttresses on each side of the building, double shouldered with stone coping. Pointed arch windows matching those on the front facade are between the buttresses. A double row of brick headers surround the tops of the openings. The stained glass panes are diamond-shaped sections within double arches in the upper sash.

The interior of the church has an elevated railed chancel opposite the entrance, containing the pulpit and choir pews (photo #6). The entrance foyer is separated from the auditorium by hinged folding doors, small ante-rooms are on each side, above this area is the balcony (photo #7).

In the 1920s a hall was added to the side of the church also containing stained glass windows, which are memorials for past members. In this section are classrooms, a fellowship hall, and a kitchen. A new roof was recently put on the hall, altering its silhouette.

An addition was constructed at the rear of the main building in 1964.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The **First United Methodist Church** in Louisa, Kentucky, formerly the Methodist Episcopal Church is one of the best examples of Gothic Revival church architecture in the Big Sandy Valley of Eastern Kentucky. Built around 1850, it is today one of the oldest existing buildings in the town and one of the oldest, if not the oldest, Methodist Church in the Big Sandy Valley Area.

Additional Information: In 1823, the Methodist Class of Louisa was formed. The group met in the town's log courthouse, and were preached to by traveling circuit riders of the day. As they grew, a simple two story frame church was built on the public square. Philosophies and politics divided the church and in 1844 during the Great Separation, the congregation split into the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Methodist Episcopal Church was the only congregation in the Big Sandy Valley which did not join the southern branch.

Land for a new building was purchased by the minister, Robert D. Callihan in 1847, and the brick church building was constructed between 1847 and 1854. Reverend Callihan was minister of the church until 1866 when he and his wife moved to Boyd County and deeded the church to the church trustees. Accounts are given of Federal troops occupying the church during the Civil War, but the most damage was done to the old church on the courthouse square.

The first parsonage was built before 1887 on the lot adjoining the church, and the present parsonage was built in 1970. The name of the church was changed to First United Methodist Church in 1968. It is one of three Methodist Churches in present day Louisa, the others being the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (now Louisa United Methodist Church), and the St. James African Methodist Episcopal Church.
