STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

J. Fred Johnson's influence on the development of "the new Kingsport" of the twentieth century, is exemplified by his nickname, "the Father of Kingsport." Johnson and his associate, John B. Dennis, did more than any other individuals to shape the present city.

A native of Virginia, Johnson established a country-style general store in Kingsport in 1905. Shortly thereafter, he met with and formed a partnership to develop a modern industrial city with Dennis, who had purchased the Clinchfield Railroad. Together the two men formed the Kingsport Improvement Company which acquired vast amounts of property in the area. Businesses, industries, and real estate developers could purchase such lands, but only after their proposed plans and design passed the scrutiny of the company, which, in fact, usually meant Johnson. The Johnson house, itself, was part of a planned residential section.

Johnson, considered a quiet but highly persuasive man, was a civic and church leader. The city did not have a Chamber of Commerce until after his death in the late 1940's; according to contemporary accounts, it simply was not necessary. When Johnson died, Kingsport had become a modern industrial city, largely through his direction, and Johnson himself had become a legend.
