GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The principal facade of 235 North Gay Street was altered at street level by the construction of a modern facade of Carrara glass, metallic panels, and display windows, uniting this building with the adjacent structure. Some of the original cast iron framing elements may remain in place behind this modern screen. The upper stories of the building remain essentially unaltered, displaying a three-bay cast-iron facade which wraps around the north corner of the building (Front Street elevation) a distance of Large window openings are flanked by Corinthian columns one bay. and headed by segmental arches. The windows are set deeply within the openings; the edge of the spandrels between the arches is decorated with a continuous molded band. Solid panels have been installed over the double-hung sash. Between the second and third floor levels, an intermediary cornice comprising crown molding above a dentil course runs between consoles decorated with heraldic shields. Piers at the corners of the facade are decorated with recessed panels. The building cornice has a deep overhang, supported on large curvilinear brackets with stylized modillions; the cornice returns at the north corner, and continues completely across the Front Street elevation. The Front Street facade is six bays wide, constructed of brick laid in common bond. The northern half of the street level has been altered, with infill and small glass-block windows. A secondary entrance remains in the south bay, and a small window is located in the second bay from the south on the street level; these openings are topped with brick segmental arches. On the second and third stories, the cast-iron structure and detailing is repeated in the westernmost bay; the remaining bays are defined by tall 2/2 sash windows with segmental-arched heads, decorated with heavy molded hoods of cast iron. The rear elevation is two bays wide, with infilled openings at each level, and a corbeled brick cornice. The interior is now connected with the neighboring building at 233 North Gay Street.

The decorative detailing of the iron front at 235 North Gay Street is similar to that of 121 North Howard Street, and to that of the Fava Fruit Company Building, which stood in the 200 block of South Charles Street until it was dismantled in 1976. Similar elements include the building cornice, Corinthian columns, side piers, and heraldic shield motif. It is likely that these

structures were the products of the same local works, although it is impossible at this time to determine which of the seven Baltimore foundries which manufactured building facades during the period may have been responsible.

HISTORY & SUPPORT:

The extensive alteration of the street pattern and numbering system occasioned by the construction of the Fallsway in 1912, and the more recent development of the Jones Falls Expressway, complicates historical research in this area of Baltimore. 235 North Gay Street achieved its present configuration about 1875. The 1880 Sanborn map shows an iron front store, 3 stories, 50' high, at this location. In 1896, Emanuel Schloss was assessed for a 3 story iron front building; M. Rosenblatt, clothier, was listed as tenant.

In 1974, the property was purchased by Anthony R. Spartana (RHB 3180/321); Spartana had founded an electronic supplies business in 1925.
