#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The original 240-acre site, known as Cienega, was purchased from a

local rancher in 1895. Located 6 miles south of Ft. Defiance and 1/4 mile south of the then-existing reservation boundary, the building had been built by Billy Meadows for a trading post but had never been used for that purpose. In 1898 it was remodeled in preparation for the missionaries. The stone walls were plastered on the inside, chimneys were raised, and the single room was partitioned to make 6 rooms. A large room at the west end was made into a chapel and one on the east was the kithen-dining-living-reception room. In between were 4 small bedrooms. The partitions were designed to be easily removed if the room should be needed for a classroom.

The building, which is approximately 27' x 60', extends east and west. It has a gabled cedar shingle roof and stands on a slight rise. On the north side there are 3 doors and 3 windows, on the southside there are 4 windows, and 1 each on the east and west sides.

The first missionaries had to construct their own benches, cupboards, bookcases, and inside doorways. The chapel, which one could only reach by passing through 3 bedrooms, had small (4" x 2") wooden crosses for the Stations of the Cross and 4 kneelers of plain unfinished wood. The room was heated by a small wood stove. Music was provided by a little organ in the room next to the chapel, according to a description written in 1902.

The site (now 640 acres) is surrounded by the reservation and is owned by the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, whose financial support has been vital to the mission.

The building is now used as a residence by a Navajo family, but the mission intends to restore the interior of the building to its original condition and use it for a museum.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The St. Michael's Mission, established in 1898, was the first permanent Catholic Mission to the Navajo.

During the Spanish period, the Navajo were never brought under the mission system nor were they subjugated by the military. They did, however, readily incorporate sheep and horses into their culture and eventually became a wide-ranging, nomadic people who regarded raiding as an important part of their lives.


Depredations reached a peak in the first years of the American Civil War when the federal troops were withdrawn but in 1863 a vigorous campaign under Kit Carson forced most of the Navajo into temporary captivity. On their return they scattered into the remote areas of their reservation, avoiding contact with Anglos and resisting Anglo education. The mission at St. Michael's contributed somewhat to the gradual breakdown of that resistance. The Franciscan Mission of St. Michael was the first permanent Catholic mission to the Navajo. The first mass in the chapel was said in October 1898. The following spring a log cabin was converted into a boarding school with two boy students. Through the years additional land was acquired, and an attempt was made to train Indians in farming and irrigation.

In 1902 a school was opened for 56 students. This ended the first phase of the mission. The second phase was planned as a period in which satellite missions would be established in areas where irrigated agriculture was possible. The original mission and school continued to grow and prosper.

The historical importance of St. Michael's to the Navajo people lies primarily in the numerous publications in and about the Navajo language and in the assistance rendered to the tribe in its successful attempts to acquire more land. Most active in these matters were Father Anselm Weber and Father Berard Haile. The Navajo dictionaries and grammars written by the missionaries were a notable contribution to scholarship.
