rutial 3-bay potico balushi rother rutdiller The Governor's Mansion is styled after the classic architecture of the French Renaissance, and closely resembles Petit Trianon, the villa of Marie Antoinette near the Palace of Versailles. The Mansion is built of native limestone and is elegantly proportioned. A front portico is graced by eight Ionic columns which rise three stories.

The east end of the main floor consists of family drawing room, dining-room, office for the Governor with private entrance and butlers pantry. The west end consists of large State drawing-room, dining-room, and ball-room.

The east end of the second floor consists of a three-room suite for the Governor and First Lady. At the west end is a bed-room, with open fireplace. This room is large enough to serve also as sitting-room and is usually reserved for special guests.

Added to these four additional bedrooms for family or guest use; each bedroom has a private bath. All bedrooms open to a very large upstairs hall which affords ample sitting-room space for the family, thus insuring greater privacy when desired. A beautiful double-winding stairway leads from the first to the second floors. On the third floor there is a compact three-room apartment consisting of two bedrooms, sitting room, and bath.

The lower level of the building is used for service area. offices and family room. An oval garden is screened by an evergreen hedge. The grounds are beautifully landscaped and maintained. Two hot houses provide fresh flowers throughout all seasons. EE INSTRUCTION S

Soon after Kentucky's new Capitol building was completed in 1910, interest was shown in providing a new home for the Governors. The Old Governor's residence had begun to show the wear and tear of passing years, and a fire had seriously weakened its walls and destroyed floors and the roof.

The Legislature of 1912 appropriated \$75,000 for the erection of a new home, and the Capitol Commission purchased the property that borders the eastern edge of the Capitol grounds. The twenty-five room structure, which harmonizes in appearance and setting with the Capitol Building, was erected on a knoll overlooking the valley of the winding Kentucky River. It was ready for occupany in 1914. Considered to be a palatial home at the time of its construction, it cost \$91,500 including grounds and original furnishings.

The Governor's Mansion was first occupied by Governor James B. McCreary in January, 1914. The Mansion was designed and built by the architectural firm of C.C. and E.A. Weber, of Fort Thomas, Kentucky.
