Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Stephen Longfellow House is a large Georgian style structure twoand-one-half stories high with a massive central chimney. The house has a gable roof and five bay facade with six-over-six double-hung sash. The main entrance located in the center of the south elevation, is enframed by pilasters supporting an entablature and pediment. Attached to the northeast corner of the house is a one-story ell with a gable roof and Greek Revival cornice returns.

Original interior woodwork exists throughout the house. The central hall and two flanking parlors, as well as a second floor bedroom, have at least one wall with floor to ceiling panelling. All of the doors, architrave trim and mantelpieces have moldings with simple profiles. In the front hall is a central staircase with a balustrade consisting of heavy turned balusters and newell posts supporting a gracefully carved handrail.

1761 Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Stephen Longfellow House is particularly significant for its fine and rare Georgian interior which rivals and is similar to the Tate House (N.R.) in Stroudwater, only a few miles away. Additionally Stephen Longfellow and his descendants, who were the immediate ancesters of the poet, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, were community leaders and active in many walks of life.

Stephen Longfellow, great-grandfather of Henry, a Harvard graduate who had been a schoolmaster in Portland, purchased the Gorham farm in 1775 when his home was burned in the fire resulting from Captain Mowatt's naval bombardment of the city. With him came his son, Stephen, Jr., at this time 25 years old with a wife and family. Quite evidently he inherited his father's intellectual talents, for in a very short time he started upon a successful law practice and became an active pariticipant in town affairs. The Gorham history says of him that he had "industry, perserverance and uprightness" and that "he was modest and unassuming". These general statements find definite proof in facts from the town records. Only nine years after he had come to Gorham we find him elected selectman, a position that he filled again and again. He was judge of the Corut of Common Pleas for years, a representative and then senator in the General Court of Massachusetts, a member of the first Board of Overseers of Bowdoin College and one of the first trustees of Gorham In his old age he was a well-known figure on the streets of Gorham Academy. since he persisted in wearing 18th century dress with a cocked hat and knee britches long after they had passed out of style.

One of his six children was also named Stephen and, like his grandfather, he graduated from Harvard and following his father's footsteps became a lawyer. He, however, settled in Portland, married Zilpha Wadsworth, and became the father of the famous poet. The young Henry spent all his vacations while growing up at his grandfather's farm and was doubtless influenced by the It is said that he wrote his first poem there, a teenage product old man. known as "Mrs. Phinney's Turnip" which does not appear in his collected works.
