Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Philip Taylor House in southwestern Oldham County, is situated on a gently rolling expanse of land surrounded by huge Hemlock and Holly trees. Built circa 1868, it is a five-bay, one-story Greek Revival/Italianate frame structure. The house rests on a stuccoed stone foundation and is crowned by a hipped roof covered with standing seam metal. Two brick inside end chimneys are found on each side. The portion of the chimneys rising from the roof have been stuccoed. Paired scrolled brackets punctuate the wide wood cornice. The front windows are ceiling to floor length and have 6/6 pane sash. Shallow segmental pediments are placed above the front facade openings.

A one-story porch with chamfered posts and sawn decoration spans the center three bays of the house. A one-room deep addition with a shed roof was added across the back circa 1900.

The floor plan is composed of a vestibule which opens off a central hall (10' X 32') with two 16 X 16 rooms off each side. A double parlor is located on the east side. The door between the vestibule and central hall is unusual in that it has a round arch door. The woodwork is composed of shouldered architrave trim. Each room has a fireplace with a simple Greek Revival mantel and coal grates.

The original floor plan is intact and the house itself is in fair condition. A log smokehouse (18' X 18') with pyramidal roof is located 50' behind the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Philip Taylor House is significant as the only one-story double-pile Greek Revival structure with a hipped roof found in Oldham County. (A comprehensive survey of historic sites of Oldham County was completed in 1981. Oldham County, formed in 1823, is located in the north middle part of the state on the Ohio River. The gently undulating land is very suitable for farming and stock raising.) The style of the Taylor House is not only unique to Oldham County, but rare for the state as well. Only a half dozen examples have been found in Kentucky, four of which are located in neighboring Jefferson County. (See the Jefferson County Multiple Resource National Register Nomination JF-216, 223, 224 and 356.) The Taylor's House original floor plan remains intact as well as its shouldered Greek Revival Trim.

Philip R. Taylor (1829–1905) is believed to have built the house circa 1868. Taylor pursued farming as a career, first acquiring land on the Ohio River in Oldham County. In 1868 he returned to the family farm, where he was born, and built the existing house. In the 1879 Atlas of Oldham County, Taylor is listed as a "farmer and breeder of Short Horns and Cotswold Sheep." In 1881, Philip Taylor was elected to the Kentucky legislature and served one term.

In 1849 Philip Taylor married Mary Adams of Jefferson County. The couple had five daughters. After the death of his first wife in 1859 Taylor married Edmonia Barrick of Oldham County and had three children.

The house is in fair condition and is in the process of being rehabilitated under the Economic Recovery Act of 1981.
