DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Maidstone Manor house is a square brick house, mechanical bond to front 1/5 sides and rear Pyramidal roof slate covered, chimneys interior on sides, midway between beak and eave parallel to front of house, one each side, brick. Three bays wide, two keep 6/6 sash front and sides, 9/6 or 6/9 in rear where windows are full length ceiling to floor at both levels. Three bay entrance portico, with paired Doric columns at side open pediment. Door double, lock with 4 panels, sidelights transom and paneled reveals. Brick stepped cornice of three rows of brick. One brick outbuilding, one side now being rebuilt, diamond vent open brick pattern in each gable end. Chimney

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Maidstone Manor Farm is very significant because it was the early home and farm land of William Robinson Leigh, a famous Western scenic artist. The house has a further significance for its outstanding architectural type, built in 1848 by William Leigh. William Robinson Leigh was born here at the Maidstone Farm Sept. 23, 1866. He was a double grandson of Rawleigh Colston and Elizabeth Marshall Colston. It was here on the Maidstone Farm land that William roamed inchildhood. He was able to observe the animals, trees, sunsets, storms and all phases of nature that made him aware of details he later needed in painting his Western scenes. It was here that he started to paint, some times on the barn and out buildings. The farm land was inherited by William Leigh and his sister, Mary Susan Selden Leigh. A division of this land was made in 1849. William Leigh, Jr. received 265 1/2 acres where he has "lately built." William Leigh sold off small tracts leaving 250 3/4 acres in the farm which still remains today.

This hipped roof, almost square house is one of a few of this type building located in Berkeley County. The house served as the mansion house of a 550 acre plantation. 250 acres of the 265 acquired by William Leigh, Jr. in 1849 still remains with the farm. The whole farm has been included because of its historical significance and agricultural representation, plus the fact that it was here on this land that William Robinson Leigh roamed and worked as a boy and developed his great appreciation for nature and it wildlife which he so realistically portrayed in his paintings.

William Robinson Leigh was born September 23, 1866, at Maidstone Manor being allowed to roam the farmland at will, he was able todserve the animals, trees, sunsets, storms and all phases of nature that would make him aware of detail that was needed later in life to make his paintings very skillful. Hequite often was found drawing pictures on doors and buildings on the farm. At the age of 14 he entered Maryland Institute. When 17 he went to the Royal Academy in Munich, Germany. He spent 4 years in Bavaria and then came back home to Berkeley County. Several people in Berkeley County today own paintings done by Leigh. Maidstone Manor was sold in 1884 when Leigh was 18. His father had suffered much loss during the Civil War and died while Maidstone was in the process of being sold by the Court to pay his creditors. Leigh returned to Berkeley County many times throughout his life and always visited Maidstone.

After Leigh's schooling abroad and a visit to Berkeley County he went to Baltimore for a year and earned enough money to return to Munich. His earlier trip had been financed by an uncle. He worked with Philip Fleish painting cycloramas. Some sold for \$1,000.00. He was now winning all kinds of awards. Leigh remained abroad for 5 years before returning to New York where he married. In 1906 Leigh finally went to thewest but maintained a studio in New York City. He went on many trips to Africa and on big game hunts in the U. S. He also turned to writing his book, Frontiers of Enchantment which was published in 1938-"an artist's adventure in Africa." Of his many writings "The Western Pony" with paintings, published in 1933, is considered the best. Leigh wrote and was featured in many magazines: Life, May 24, 1937, The ⁴merican Museum of ^Natural History in Nov. and Dec. issues were devoted to the African Expedition, Colliers Nov. 1950, True Sept. 1951, Saturday Evening Post April 1951 are but a few.

Leigh died in 1955. His studio at 200 West 57th St., New York, was given by Mrs. Leigh to Gilcrease Puseum in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where it is open to the public.

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
