DESCRIPTION The 1914 Jessie Smith Farmstead house is a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ story structure with a "T" floor plan. The house has a gable roof with wide exposed eaves and brackets. The foundation is concrete block with basement windows. The floors are separated by a wooden belt course. The front facade features a screened, L-shaped wrap-around porch with Classical columns. Ashed canopy with brackets covers a coupled, double hung, rectangular window unit in the front gable. The west facade has a gable wall dormer with brackets and unusual fenestrations. The east facade features a bracketed gable shed roof over paired double hung windows. First floor windows on the east facade include double hung windows with multiple lights, forming sixteen over one lights. The rear facade has two entrances: one with a shed roof cover, and one with a bracketed shed roof cover. A corn crib is also found on the farmstead.

STYLE Western Stick Style

DATE 1914

SIGNIFICANCE The Jessie Smith Farmstead is significant in three areas: architecture, settlement and agriculture. The 1914 house is probably the best example of Western Stick Style within the resource area. Settlement and agriculture are tied together in that both reflect part of the development and growth in those areas.

BOUNDARIES The nominated property is located 2000 feet southeast of the Berkley School and 1600 feet north of the northern point of the Yankton Clay Creek Ditch.
