

DESCRIPTION: (cont.) 5 panel frieze on mantel in E. rm. w/fluted pilasters; W. rm. has cupboards on either side of fireplace; chairrails; pronounced architrave; 5 panel mantel frieze.

A 9' X 18' half-dove-tailed log pen w/shed wings sits to the S. of the house.

HISTORY: (cont.) Richard Croake began acquiring all of the separate property interests. When Richard died in 1860, he willed the farm where he lived, apparently the Kendrick home, to his son, Oliver. Oliver's name shows as the owner on the 1877 Beers map. O. Croake owned the property until 1891 when he sold to John R. Barber. The property then exchanged hands several times and was not back into Croake hands clearly until 1924. R. L. Croake purchased $\frac{1}{2}$ interest in 1910, then the other $\frac{1}{2}$ interest in 1924. Upon his death he left the property to his children, Ollie May Croake Strange and Kendrick Croake.

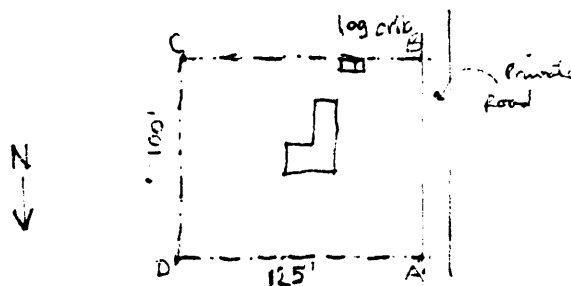

Verbal Boundary Description Acreage 1 acre

Point A is located 65 feet northwest of the northwest corner of the house. Beginning at Point A, south 100 feet along the east side of the drive to Point B, thence east 125 feet along a fence to the rear of the house to Point C, thence north 100 feet along a fence to Point D, thence west 125 feet along a fence to the point of origin. The boundaries were chosen to encompass the house and domestic-related space including a log corn crib, all enclosed by fences and a road. The corn crib is the only contributing outbuilding. The nominated area contains one contributing building and one contributing structure.
