DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Nathan Cooper Grist Mill is a 3 story random fieldstone structure. Built in 1826, the front facade of the building is highlighted by rectangular stone lintel with keystones capping the fenestration. The 3 bays of the first two floors are spaced equidistance from one another and also the buildings' corners. The stones at the end of the facade are larger than those used in the main construction producing a quoin-like effect. The third floor, which is above the eaves, also has three bays, but sapced closer together than the first two bays. The center bays of all three floors are wide doorways to accomodate heavy usage. Near the peak is a circular opening. At the peak is a block and tackle apparatus.

There is a massive stone chimney off the side of the front facade.

Built on a slope, the full basement is clearly exposed in the sides and rear of the mill. Fenestrations of these facades are irregular.

Apparently originally using a water-wheel the ruins of the enclosing wheel house are evident. This foundation, attached to the main mill building, is of a different type of construction; being dry masonry and of a more regular form.

Presently owned by the Morris County Parks Commission which ultimately hopes to completely restore the mill.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Nathan Cooper Grist Mill, constructed in 1826, is one of the areas few early 19th century stone grist mills and the last remaining one in Chester Township. This small mill, only a local concern, represents the interdependence necessary between farmers and the local miller in the 19th century.

The opening of the Morris Canal and the laying of railroads following the first quarter of the 19th centruy caused a decrease in the flow of traffic through Chester. In addition, improved roads no longer necessitated the formerly common overnight stays of travelers. As a result Chester declined economically between 1810 and 1850.

In spite of this decline in 1826 this grist mill was erected by Nathan A. Cooper, who inherited extensive farming lands, an iron mine, mineral properties, and a grist mill in 1818 when only 16 years old.

The present grist mill, however, does not appear to be the same mill property he inherited from his father. Instead, this mill property was acquired from Elias Howell in 1825. Howell had a 3 1/2 acre "mill lot" which included a "grist mill and saw mill on premises, mill wheel, mill stones, with all the machinery contained on the said grist mill, also the mill wheel." This mill, which dated to the late 18th century was destroyed by fire the same year Cooper acquired the property. Cooper then commenced to build the present stone grist mill which continued to grind grain up until the turn of the century.

Nathan Cooper (1802-1879) was a notable Morris County citizen a gentleman farmer with ownership in several small agri-industrial pursuits. Cooper's influence is indicated in his numerous official positions, the most significant of which were Justice of Peach (1834) and one of three County Judges (1844). Cooper was also a commissioned Brigadier General in the Morris County cavalry of the State Militia.
