## Description

The Virginia Corey Goodridge House (BE-621) is a 1922 Colonial Revival vernacular residence of wood frame construction with an original veneer of yellow brick. With reference to the Multiple Property Documentation Form, "Historic Resources of Boone County, Kentucky," the Goodridge House represents Property Type IE, *domestic architecture/central passage double-pile house*. The building is set on a foundation of rubble stone, with a symmetrical three-bay facade and a shallow hipped roof with broadly overhanging eaves which retain their original tongue-and-groove wood surfaces (Photos 1, 2, 3). Two chimneys break the plane of the roof. A one-story front porch extends across the facade of the property; originally open, the porch has been glass-enclosed, but retains its original brick supports and detailing and has not been seriously compromised. The facade is punctuated by three openings. The main entry to the house (Photo 4) is centered on the first story, and is highlighted by an eight-panel door flanked by three-light sidelights and enframed by fluted columns and pilasters salvaged from the Southern Hotel (see Fig. 1) which formerly occupied this site. Fenestration employs flat-topped windows, six-over-one lights, set on extended limestone sills and capped with soldier-course brick lintels. Windows are arranged singly and in groups and are devoid of any notable architectural embellishment. At the rear of the property is a one-story open porch of wood, set on brick piers, trimmed with a simple square-spindled balustrade and capped with a shed roof (Photo 5).

The interior of the house is arranged around a central hallway with a straight-run stair, ornamented with a modest newel and balustrade (Photos 6). Original woodwork is intact throughout. The walls are of plaster, generally wallpapered, and the floor-to-ceiling dimensions are original.

The Goodridge House is located on a 0.39-acre tract in the heart of the city of Florence. The builkding is oriented to the northwest and is at the southeast corner of Main and Youell Streets, in a mixed-use commercial/residential neighborhood. No historic outbuildings are associated with the property. One dependency is on the property, a one-story open carport with a gable roof, located immediately northeast of the house; it is of modern construction and is a non-contributing feature within he context of the nomination (Photo 9). A low stone wall defines the property's western boundary and a tapered stone pillar-perhaps originally one of a pair-stands adjacent to the front sidewalk. These two elements are considered to be landscape features and are not included in the resource count for the nominated property.

## Significance

The Virginia Corey Goodridge House (BE-621) is significant under National Register Criterion C, for its architectural design, as one of Boone County's most distinctive residences from the first quarter of the twentieth-century and as an excellent local vernacular representation of the Colonial Revival style. Extremely well preserved, the property retains integrity of materials, setting, association, workmanship, design, and feeling. The house is a representative example of Property Type IE resources (*domestic architecture/central passage, double pile house*) and meets fully the Registration Requirements for such resources, as set forth in Section F of the Boone County MPDF. It is significant within with Historic Context V, *Domestic Architecture in Boone County, 1789-1950*.

The Goodridge House was built in 1922 on the site of the Southern Hotel, along Main Street in Florence, which, at that time was Boone County's largest city. Florence dates from the early years of the nineteenth century, and has been known by a variety of names including Crossroads, Maddensville, Connersville, Polecat (referring to the one-time location of a den of skunks in the settlement), and eventually Florence. The village was incorporated in 1830 and was located along the Georgetown Road, which was eventually chartered as the Covington and Lexington Turnpike. With the advent of the automobile, the turnpike became known as the Dixie Highway. At the time of writing, Florence is the largest city in the county; the Goodridge House, in the heart of the city of, is located along the Dixie Highway.

The house was erected for farmer William Horace Goodridge, who with his wife, Virginia, built the home for his retirement. William Goodridge's occupancy of the property was short-lived, since he died one year after the new house was completed; its naming reflects his wife's long association with the property. She resided here until her death in 1968, after which time the property passed to her daughter, Elizabeth Dell Nestor and at the time of writing is owned by Virginia Goodridge's great-granddaughter, Virginia Nestor Kohl.

Architecturally, the house is a vernacular adaptation of the Colonial Revival style of design, which gained popularity in the wake of the 1876 celebration commemorating the centennial of the United States. A resurgence of interest in the American Colonial era occurred, and new homes were designed based upon pre-Revolutionary antecedents. The Colonial Revival style was the dominant architectural mode for domestic design in the first half of the twentieth century. Some of these buildings were technically very close to their predecessors, while others borrowed only the form and minor detailing from their earlier models. The Goodridge House is one of the latter and is an example of the "hipped roof with full-width porch" house form as described by Virginia and Lee McAlester in their **A Field Guide to American Houses**.<sup>1</sup>


## JUSTIFICATION

The boundaries for this nomination encompass the Virginia Corey Goodridge House and its associated lot; the house has been associated historically with this property and retains its architectural integrity and significance.



Some of these buildings were technically very close to their predecessors, while others borrowed only the form and minor detailing from their earlier models. The Goodridge House is one of the latter and is an example of the "hipped roof with full-width porch" house form as described by Virginia and Lee McAlester in their **A Field Guide to American Houses**.<sup>1</sup>


## JUSTIFICATION
