Richmond School House/Richmond Town Library National Register Nomination

The Richmond School House was built in 1850 and is located facing a major thoroughfare near Town Cross roads. The School House is a wooden one-story building with gable roof. The main structure measures 31'6" by 24'6" and the east addition measures 22'0" by 20'6". Attached to the west elevation of the main structure is a small one room gable-roof addition with an exterior door on the north elevation. The main entrance is located on the west portion of the north elevation and consists of a six-paneled door flanked by fluted pilasters and surmounted by a recently-applied pedimented entrance roof supported by brackets. Windows in the main building have two over two double-hung sash except for one window which still contains the original twelve over eight sash.

A 1974 wooden one story addition with a gable roof is located on the east elevation and contains a below-grade, fire-retardant masonry vault that houses the Richmond Town Archives. An open cantilevered porch is connected to the north elevation of the addition, provides an exterior access to the reading room and has an open-riser stair to the lower level. Windows in the addition have eight over eight double-hung sash.

Original appearance: The original building had a belfry located on the western end of the ridge and a chimney rising from the eastern end. Windows formerly had twelve over eight sash and exterior blinds. In 1962 the building was converted into the Town Library and in 1974 an addition was made to the eastern elevation. Changes from these renovations include the removal of the belfry and chimney, the replacement of original wooden shingles with asphalt shingling and metal flashing, and the addition of a pedimented roof over the main entrance. The interior has been converted to accommodate the library and changes made for this purpose includes a hung ceiling with fluorescent lighting, knotty pine wall paneling, doors, window trim, and ceiling-to-floor adjustable wood shelving, plasterboard ceilings, hardwood floors and improved toilet facilities.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Richmond Schoolhouse is significant as an educational building that has served the people of Richmond since 1850. The building was used as a school until 1947, then in 1962 the town converted the building into a library. The Schoolhouse is actively used for educational purposes, including reading programs for children, meetings and forums. The Richmond Schoolhouse remains as an important cultural and educational center.

EDUCATION: The dispersed pattern of settlement adopted by most New Hampshire towns required the construction of district schoolhouses throughout each township to serve local families. Such buildings, of which Richmond Schoolhouse No. 6 is typical, were utilized for both summer and winter sessions throughout the 1700s and 1800s. The origins of the district school system in Richmond date to 1784, when the township was divided into such jurisdictions as a result of earlier petitions from families living in various parts of the community. The district at the geographical and administrative center of town, established in 1815, was designated No. 6. The present schoolhouse in this district is the second on the site, an earlier brick building having been destroyed by fire in 1850. School districts in Richmond grew to a maximum of sixteen in 1848, after which the number of districts slowly decreased as population declined in various parts of the township. In common with most New Hampshire towns, Richmond responded to its loss of population be consolidating school districts as inhabitants deserted remote areas. This tendency resulted in the abandonment and eventual destruction or conversion of most of the sixteen small district schoolhouses that had formerly been distributed throughout the township.

Due to its central location, Schoolhouse No. 6 continued in use as a school building longer than all but one similar structure in town. The building continued its original use as a schoolhouse until 1947; the town converted it into a library in 1962. An addition in 1974 made the structure a safe and central repository for the records and archives of the town. The schoolhouse is presently used both as a library and for a variety of educational functions, accommodating reading programs for children, meetings and forums. Through its adaptation to meet changing needs, Schoolhouse No. 6 has continued since 1850 to serve an educational purpose in Richmond, remaining a focus of cultural, educational and historical activity in the town.
