

The Lewis H. Stanton House is located on an unusually large lot on Morris' west side. The house is set back a distance from the street and a semi-circular drive leads to the front entrance.

The two story frame residence features polychromed Stick Style detailing. Prominent elements are the irregular gable roof and broad exterior chimneys on the north, south, and west facades. At the northeast corner of the house is a three story tower with a pyramidal roof, the south facade includes a two story window bay with angled windows on the ground level, and the east facade features a one story window bay. Windows are double hung, 16/1, with many of the panes in the upper sash of pastel colored stained glass. The current painting scheme of the house emphasizes the stick framing around the clapboard siding.

Except for some changes on the front entranceway, the house retains good integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lewis H. Stanton House is significant among the late 19th century housing stock of the city of Morris and Stevens County for its architectural detailing and prominent siting. The city of Morris was platted in 1869 by the St. Paul and Pacific Railroad Company on their newly constructed line from St. Paul. Eleven years later, Lewis Stanton relocated to Morris from Washington D.C. (Stanton was the son of Edwin Stanton, Attorney General under President Buchanan and Secretary of War under President Lincoln), apparently for health reasons. Lewis had been born in Washington in 1860 and attended Princeton. In Stevens County, he operated a stock farm in Section 23 of Morris Township, and constructed his home - "The Chimneys" - in the newly-platted Sutherlands Addition on the west edge of the city of Morris. A letter written by Stanton in 1924 indicates that the architect for the house was an eastern schoolmate of his and that several modifications to the plans were necessary to adapt the house The Stick Style features and three prominent chimneys to the Minnesota climate. mark the house as a distinctive residence in Morris. Stanton lived in the house until about 1890, when he and his family moved to New Orleans; he lived there until his death in 1938. The house retains a prominent position and reputation in the city of Morris.
