

Figures 1 and 2 are the two sides of a Portuguese Gold Coin of King John V, dated 1722, 4,000 Reis.




Figure 3 Pewter buttons



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*Figure 4* Lead weight, possibly used for depth findings.




Figure 5 Brass scale weight



Figure 6 Top of brass scale weight




Figure 7 Brass Hammer possibly used by ship's blacksmith





Figure 8 Pewter bowl with inscription of one of the crew.



*Figure* 9 Feather-edged Creamware plate




Figure 10 Detail of featheredged Creamware plate








Figure 11 Chinese bowl fragments showing motif
