DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The property nominated for Hanging Rock Historic Site includes the high ground around Hanging Rock, a portion of Hanging Rock Creek, and the plateau to the west of the creek that centers around county road 58. Hanging Rock itself, near which General Sumter's men left their horses before going into battle, is east of the creek on a high bluff. The whole area on the east side of the creek is strewn with huge, rounded boulders and is heavily wooded with steep banks. To the west of the creek, the ground rises sharply and reaches a plateau, where the British and Tories camped. Bryan's Tories were camped to the north, the British Legion troops immediately to the south, and Major Bryan's troops south of the Legion. This plateau was partly wooded and partly open fields, some of which are still visible along road 58. On the extreme south end of the nominated property, along road 58, are several houses and the Mt. Zion Church and cemetery.

North of Hanging Rock, on Hanging Rock Creek immediately above the county road bridge, is an old Indian ford. Large flat boulders in the creek bed connect the two banks at this point.

The Battle of Hanging Rock was one of approximately 182 recorded battles and skirmishes that took place in South Carolina.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

As part of a series of strongholds planned to maintain the British position in South Carolina, an outpost was established at Hanging Rock in 1780. The importance of this post was in its strategic location on the road from Camden to Charlotte.

The first American attack on the post occurred on July 30, 1780, led by Major William Richardson Davie, with forty dragoons and forty mounted riflemen. General Thomas Sumter simultaneously attacked the British post at Rocky Mount, about 15 miles to the east on the Broad River. Davie's attack on a garrisoned house near the fort at Hanging Rock, and not the fort itself, was successful; he took about 60 horses and 100 stand of arms. Sumter was unable to take the post at Rocky Mount, and in retreating, met two parties of British coming to reinforce the post. They skirmished, and about 60 British and 20 Americans were killed. Sumter came away from the fight with prisoners, horses, and arms.

On August 5, 1780, Sumter crossed the ^{catawba} ~~Broad~~ River 20 miles north of Rocky Mount at Land's Ford, where his 300 South Carolina militiamen were joined by about 500 North Carolinians under Major Davie and Colonel Robert Irwin. They marched 16 miles during the night and reached Hanging Rock Creek early Sunday morning.

The British garrison was held by 1,400 men under the command of Major Carden of the Prince of Wales Regiment. They were encamped on the west side of the creek, on high ground protected by a deep ravine formed by the creek. The British units lay in three divisions, from north to south along the ridge: about 900 Tories under Colonel Samuel Bryan on a hill south of Hanging Rock Creek, (separated from the center by a ravine and band of woods; about 160 of Colonel Tarleton's Legion and Hamilton's Regiment in some houses at the center; and the British regulars under Colonel Brown in open ground to the south.

Sumter's surprise attack began at six o'clock, the men advancing across the creek against Bryan's Tory militia. Sumter meant to attack the entire British line, but misjudged; the American units met instead the northern end of the British line. Within half an hour the Americans had taken the Tory camp, sending the Tories fleeing through the woods into the center of the British line. Tarleton's troops charged twice with fixed bayonets, aided by Brown's regiment advancing on the Americans' right flank. Sumter's

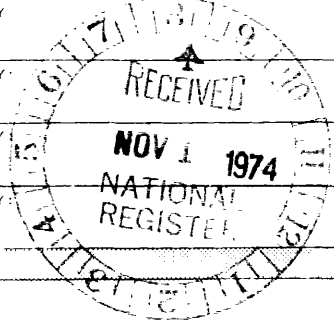

men took cover behind rocks and trees, firing into the mass of British troops. Within a few minutes, most of the British officers were shot down; Major Carden resigned his command to Captain Rousslet of Tarleton's Legion.

Sumter's troops then attacked the main British camp, using British ammunition. The British retreated further south to Colonel Robinson's camp, but Sumter moved in and took two-thirds of that camp also.

At this point, some 40 of Tarleton's calvary were returning to camp and heard the noise of the battle. They attacked the Americans, but turned back by Major Davies' calvary, they retreated towards Camden.

After three hours of fighting, many of Sumter's men were unable to continue the battle. It was agreed to plunder the British camp and depart. About one o'clock that afternoon, the Americans left the Hanging Rock fort while the British looked on.

During this engagement, American losses included 20 men killed, 40 wounded, and 10 missing. About 130 British and Tories were killed, with an equal number wounded, and 73 taken prisoner. General Sumter was himself wounded but continued directing his troops until their withdrawal from the battle.
