This house, a large brick structure with projecting gabled pavillions at the front elevation and a low pitched roof with a wide frieze and brackets is characteristic of the Italian VIIIa style as expressed in the South Branch Valley. It is a restrained and simple version of the style, but the prominent features, the low pitched roof, brackets and broad frieze show influence of the Italian VIIIa style. As such the house is significant as an example of a prosperous rural residence from the late 19th century in the South Branch Valley.

It is a stylish building for its time and one that reflects a degree of sophistication on the part of the builder/designer. Located near the village of Upper Tract, the house is located in an area of fairly level fertile bottom land where there is a collection of prosperous farms.

The Cunningham-Hevener House is the most significant Italianate-style dwelling in the Upper Tract area of Pendleton County. Built for one William H. Cunningham, the house features many of the hallmarks of the Italianate style including low profile gabled roofs, bracketed eaves and a broken plane or setback achieved by the construction of two forward-facing wings that create a "U"-shaped plan. A 19th-century classical-style one-story porch runs across the entire front elevation of the house.

The Upper Tract region of Pendleton County is important as one of the earliest areas of settlement of Pendleton County. The Robert Green survey permitted settlement as early as 1752. Several years later lands were parceled out to Cunninghams, Hinkles, Mosers, Petersons and Fishers.
