DESCRIPTION:

This hewn-log home, measuring approximately sixteen-by-thirty-feet with a hewn-log partition creating two sixteen-by-fifteen spaces inside, is constructed of timbers taken from the area, fitted together in the Finnish style, and double notched at the corners. The structure is fourteen logs high to the gables, which are sided with milled boards placed horizontally. The hewn-log partition is notched into the exterior wall and cut flush with the outside timbers. The building has a door on the south end, windows on its west and north walls, and an attic door in the south gable. Its east wall has been cut away so that the building can be used as a garage by its present owners, the Lake Irrigation District. It sits on a rock foundation and its roof is covered with corrugated metal sheeting.

SIGNIFICANCE:

This structure is at least seventy-five years old, for Gust Laituri the builder died in 1906, and it is a good example of the Finnish techniques of fitting logs together horizontally and of extending inside partitions through the outside walls. Although its east side has been cut away and the structure is currently being used for a garage, it is one of the oldest and soundest Finnish-built log home- stead buildings in Long Valley.
