The Gottlieb Storz residence is a beautiful example of the stately homes built in Omaha's Gold Coast area around the turn of the century. Successful Omaha businessmen were the developers of the Gold Coast area. Gottlieb Storz, founder of the Storz Brewery, was the original owner and his son, Arthur C. Storz, still resides in the home. Thomas R. Kimball, successful Omaha architect, designed the house in 1907.

The style is Jacobethan Revival and is in evidence by the rectangular windows with their stone mullions and transoms, the steep gables, the ridged roof, the tall chimneys, and the use of brick and stone. The pair of two-story bay windows on the front of the house display the deep stone mullions and transoms around the large windows to the best advantage. The enclosed front porch with its pointed arched windows and crenellated roofline, both outlined in stone, give the entryway a sense of stateliness and strength. The roofline is varied by the many gables, dormer windows and chimneys which are of different heights. They are placed to balance one another with three on each side of the building. The half-circle of stone decoration above each gable window has the Storz family crest carved in low relief. The exterior materials are tan brick and tan stone trim.

The grounds contain a garden on the west side of the house. A domed gazebo is placed there. It is the only known structure remaining from

Omaha's Trans-Mississippi Exposition of 1898.

The formal foyer is impressive with its classical moldings and columns. The two newel posts at the base of the main stairway hold metal lighting fixtures made in France. The fixtures are made up of a spray of flowers which light up and these hover over a small statue. The chandelier in the center of the foyer repeats the curving vine and flower forms of the newel post lights. On the ceiling above the main stairway, a painting of cherubs and foliage is placed. The fireplaces in the living and dining rooms which are the focal points in each room are done in mosaics. French eighteenth century designs are used as trim on the living room fireplace mosaic and are carried throughout the room in the ceiling and wall moldings. The dining room fireplace is also decorated with a mosaic. In addition, it has a Tiffany glass panel of leaves and branches above the fireplace.

One of the most outstanding rooms is the Sun Room on the east side of the building. A light, airy feeling is created by the Tiffany glass skylight and by the windows on three sides of the room. The effect is further enhanced by the open lattice-work trim which is carried throughout on the

windowseats, the ceiling beams, and the walls.

The residence is in excellent condition, being well-preserved by the family. It has not been altered and the original design and details show through. This home is one of the few in the area still owned and inhabited by the family of the original owner.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE	·		

The Gottlieb Storz residence was designed by Thomas R. Kimball who was one of the most prominent architects Nebraska has produced. He was respected locally and designed many impressive commercial, residential and municipal buildings in Omaha. Nationally known in his profession, he was president of the American Institute of Architects from 1918 to 1920. His firm of Walker and Kimball were architects-in-chief of the Trans-Mississippi Exposition at Omaha in 1898. As professional advisor, he served many commissions including the Nebraska State Capitol Commission, the Kansas City War Memorial Commission and the Indiana War Memorial Commission. Kimball, in accord with general architectural practice of the times, worked in many historical styles which were then modified to fulfill the functional requirements of the owners. In this residence, the Jacobethan Revival style is used. It is successful in achieving an imposing structure which also satisfies the functional requirements of the owners.

Gottlieb Storz was an enterprising Omaha merchant who worked his way up in the world. A native of Germany, he learned the art of brewing there. After settling in Omaha in 1876, he found employment as a foreman in the Baumann Brewery. Eight years later, he purchased that brewery with a partner, Joseph Iler, and formed the company which eventually became Storz Brewing Company. By 1891, forty-five thousand barrels of beer were produced annually, three-fourths of which was sold in Omaha. A new brewery was constructed in 1894 at a cost of 500 thousand dollars. The business continued to grow and Storz became one of the wealthier men of Omaha, many of whom decided to build homes in the Gold Coast area.
