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#### **DESCRIPTION**

The Nora Store is located at 30705 475<sup>th</sup> Avenue on the west side of the highway in the Alcester, South Dakota vicinity. The building was constructed in 1907 by I. Morgan Asjbeld, the lead carpenter, with assistance from many of the local people in the community. The façade of the building faces east toward the highway. The building is located on the east end of a gradual slanting small hill from the west in a very small community that includes a handful of houses but no other commercial type property.

The Nora Store is a gabled one and a half story building of no particular architectural style. The façade features a false front and a large wood awning flat roof supported by four square stucco brick pillars that cover the main entrance to the building. The entrance under the awning has a concrete floor. On the south end of the building a flat, open three stall lean-to addition with six more stucco brick pillars was added in 1919. The addition covers one third of the south elevation. The stalls were constructed for the purpose of servicing automobiles. The main entrance has a wooden door with single pane glass, sidelights and a leaded glass transom window. Flanking both sides of the front door are two large picture windows with vertical muntins dividing each and a smaller rectangular leaded glass section on top of both. A shed roof addition was added to the north side in 1919 also. This addition covers the entire depth of the building and features a large, wooden, double swinging door opening on the façade. Paired two over two double hung windows are located in the gable centered in the false front.

The south elevation west of the open stalls, from left to right, features two small rectangular windows divided by a vertical muntin. To the right is a double hung twelve over two window. The upper half of the window is a Queen Anne style large pane surrounded by smaller panes. Above the two small rectangular windows, is another window of the same size and style.

The west elevation from left to right features a large wooden double swinging door similar to the one on the façade. To the right are two four over four double hung windows and small enclosed entryway addition with the door opening on the south end. The door is wooden with a small single pane window in the upper half. Centered in the gable on the second floor is another four over four double hung window.

The north elevation of the Nora Store has no openings.

#### **SIGNIFICANCE**

The Nora Store near Alcester, South Dakota is significant for its vernacular architecture that was prevalent in many small communities in eastern South Dakota during the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. This style, lacking hardly any ornamentation, frequently presented itself in early South Dakota history and is certainly historic and representative of early commercial structures in rural communities. These false front buildings were built to emulate the profile of buildings in larger cities and to promote a sense of prosperity. Many of these false-front commercial buildings no longer remain. If the town was successful, these false front buildings were replaced by more permanent brick commercial buildings. If the town wasn't successful, these false-front buildings were often razed and their lumber taken elsewhere, or they were left to deteriorate and fall down. Very few remain with integrity. Often the rural country stores survived as they were the only center of trade in a surrounding area. These stores often existed at cross-roads and were know as four corner stops. For these reasons the Nora Store is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

The territory that Union County occupies today was inhabited by Sioux Indians prior to 1859. A treaty between the Federal Government and the Yankton Sioux moved them to the reservation further west toward the Missouri River. Immediately following this move, white immigration the area began.<sup>1</sup>

Union County was first created and organized as Cole County in honor of a territorial legislator, Austin Cole in 1862. January 7, 1864 the legislature rearranged the boundaries of Cole and Lincoln counties and the name Cole was changed to Union. This name was probably chosen because of the strong sentiment existing at the time of the Civil War.<sup>2</sup>

The community of Nora was settled in 1871 by Norwegians who had migrated first to Michigan to work in the mines and then later moved west as homesteaders. A few years later additional Norwegian settlers came to Nora from Wisconsin as well.<sup>3</sup> One of the earliest settlers in Nora was I.M. Asbjeld who was responsible for naming the community "Nora". He claimed that "Nora" was short for Norway.<sup>4</sup>

Chris Stenholt owned the first store in Nora in 1898, where the present Nora store is today. The store was later sold to Mr. Wells and Carl Oden and after a fire destroyed it, the new Nora Store was built in 1907. A few years later Carl Oden bought out Wells<sup>5</sup>

The Nora Store served as a general store for the community as well as an automobile repair shop up until the 1950's. Although it hasn't operated as any type of retail store for several decades, the building still serves as a gathering center for many of the local people who come on special occasions to listen to pipe organ music and simply reminisce about old times in Nora.<sup>6</sup>

The Nora Store is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places because it is a good representation of the types of early commercial buildings that were built in the rural communities of southeast South Dakota in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. These types of buildings were usually made of wood before commercial buildings of brick, in these very small rural communities, came onto the scene. Most of these vernacular type structures were not constructed by professional building companies but were constructed by one or two semi-professional carpenters with a lot of help from local general laborers.

#### **GEOGRAPHICAL DATA**

#### **VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION**

The boundary of the Nora Store is an imaginary line encompassing only the store itself. The line starts at a point ten feet northwest of the northwest corner of the store. The line then runs east to a point ten feet northeast of the northeast corner of the store. The line then runs south to a point ten feet southeast of the southeast corner of the lean-to garage. The line then runs west to a point ten feet southwest of the southwest corner of the store and then straight north to the original starting point.

#### **BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION**

The boundary includes only the store. There are no other buildings on the property.
