The Ionic tetrastyle entrance is the most distinguishing feature of this courthouse with an H - shaped floor plan. The two story white stone columns contrast with cream colored brick. At the third story level, directly over the columns, the words 'Tift County Courthouse' are cut in stone. At the roofline, capping the entrance is a cartouche flanked by roaring lion's heads (a romantic addition).

A flight of steps leads to the recessed porch that features round arched windows and a small balcony over the main doorway. Bricks have been laid to create decorative patterns and textures, for instance, as quoins on the corners of the building. The triple windows in the corner pavilions have a heavy, bracketed lintel on the first story and radiating stone and brick lintels on the second and third stories.

The interior has marble wainscoting. In the courtroom, Ionic pilasters circle the room; on the sides, they alternate with round arched windows. The judge's bench is emphasized by single Corinthian columns with a full entablature.

## SIGNIFICANCE:

One of the few examples of the Beaux Arts Classicism in Georgia courthouses, this building is unique for its sculptured lions heads. No others are found like them. The building is well kept and reflects the pride the citizens still feel in their center of governmental activity. When the city high school (now federal office building) was built in the 1920's, the architect echoed the style of the courthouse in material choice, massing and some design elements, showing the importance of the courthouse structure to the townspeople. It reflected as well as molded their architectural taste.

William A. Edwards (1866-1939) the architect worked in Atlanta after 1908. He did several courthouses in S.C., as well as the Fannin County (Ga.) Courthouse in 1936. He was also known for commercial and religious structures. He also did the Florida A & M College Administration Building in Tallahassee.
