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Narrative Description

The Madisonville Armory (HK-M-120), located at 670 Park Avenue, meets National Register criferia A (historic association) and C (type of construction). The armory was completed in 1947 and designed by architect Robert W. McMeekin. R.P. Whitton was the engineer for the project; the building company is unknown. The Madisonville Armory serves as both a military and community center for Madisonville, and is situated on a hill overlooking the city park. The brick armory consists of a two-story central block with one-story wings on either side. The three-bay east elevation (front facade) features a set of glass doors flanked by sidelights and a transom. Brick pilasters mark off the central section of the building. The one-story wings each have three windows apiece. A limestone surround with an inscribed eagle and the words NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY sits above the doorway. The louvered windows are distinctive to the Madisonville Armory; windows of that type are not found on any other Kentucky armories. The windows can be opened from the inside by a hand crank.

The Madisonville Armory has three floors - a basement, first, and second floors. The armory sits on a fall-away lot, and the basement houses the maintenance/OMS area, storage and utility rooms. The first floor contains offices, storage rooms, and a day room. A few steps up from the first floor is the drill hall. Unlike the other post-World War II armories, the Madisonville drill hall was built with a concrete floor. A second-floor balcony overlooks the drill hall, and features four rows of concrete seats. Tall multi-light metal casement windows run along the north and south walls of the room. A concrete block room with a handicapped-accessible elevator was added to the drill hall in the 1970s, in compliance with the American Disability Act. This elevator goes to the basement. Original wooden doors are located throughout the building.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Madisonville Armory (HK-M-120) meets criteria A (historic association) and C (type of construction) of the National Register of Historic Places. The armory is relevant to the history of the National Guard during the period of significance: 1931-1951. The armory meets the multiple property listing's registration requirements established for the armory property type because it possesses integrity of location, setting, materials, design, and association. The armory maintains integrity of location and setting because it remains in the same place and the park setting is the same as well. The building retains most of its original materials: it has the original windows, drill hall floor, original wooden doors and hardware, and original radiators. The metal casement windows in the drill hall are original, as well. The design of the armory is the same: administrative building with attached drill hall, and original interior arrangement, with only one or two exceptions. The armory retains its integrity of association because it is owned by the National Guard/Commonwealth of Kentucky, and has been used as an armory since its completion in 1947.

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The Madisonville Armory is recognizable as an armory, having the main components of that building type (design): an administrative building with an attached drill hall, and interior room arrangement is the same. The armory has served as both a community and military center for the community. The armory is a good example of a late 1940s armory in Kentucky because of its large size and forbidding appearance. The armory is significant for its association with the National Guard, a state-based military entity.

Men from Hopkins County have been involved in a militia of some type since the early 1800s, and have been involved in several wars, including the War of 1812, the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, and World Wars I and II. The soldiers were mobilized for the Berlin Crisis in 1961, and went to Fort Stewart, Georgia, for training. Units which have been in Madisonville include: Headquarters Company of the 3/149th Infantry, Company C, 243rd Tank Battalion, Company C, 123rd Armor, and currently, Company A, 2/123rd Armor.

The National Guard has participated in many state active duties, including flood and snow emergencies, riots and prison escapes, and security for the execution of death row inmate Harold McQueen in July, 1997. Besides serving as the home of the soldiers, the Madisonville Armory has served as a home for many community events, such as dances in the drill hall, basketball games, meetings, and Rotary Club functions. When the men returned from the Berlin Crisis in 1962, a dance was held in their honor at the armory.

The Madisonville Armory has served as an important building for the community because it serves as both a community and military center.

Verbal Boundary Description - The parcel designated by the Hopkins County PVA as tax map/parcel #M-33-37-26.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The chosen boundary encompasses the building, its related motor pool and parking lot, and forested land behind the armory, for a total of 4.8 acres, the area historically associated with the Madisonville Armory.
