DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The 1883-84 Nebraska Loan and Trust Company Building, commonly known as the Clarke-Buchanan Building, occupies the northwest corner of Second Street and Lincoln Avenue in the business district of Hastings, Nebraska (1970 pop., 23,580). This L-shaped Victorian Italianate structure, evidently adapted from a pattern book, has three stories at end sections and two stories above an elevated basement at the corner section. Walls are of brick construction and there is an abundance of stone trim. Neighboring buildings are either recent constructions or altered older structures.

The rusticated stone basement, a partial level exposed on the east and south, is approached from the sidewalk by two fine cast-iron staircases. The brick walls are rendered a sense of liveliness through the use of pilaster strips, stone bands, small polychromatic tiles, and a variety of treatments at window heads in either stone or terra cotta.

The street level of the double end sections on the north and west were cast-iron shopfronts; only one shopfront remains and it is in its nearly original state (see right side of accompanying exterior photograph). The principal entrance to the building's corner section was initially on the beveled corner wall. Around 1915 this opening—surrounded by an eclectic stone frontispiece—was moved to the neighboring western division and its former position was transformed into windows for the basement and first level.

A pressed-metal parapet synthesizing simulated moldings, modillions, and triglyphs and metopes wraps around the apex of the facades. Two pedimented cornice projections have been removed: one was situated atop the beveled corner wall and the other was above the corner section's auxiliary entrance on the east. The building fronts Second Street for 66 feet and Lincoln Avenue for 125 feet.

The best preserved interior spaces are in the building's corner or southeastern portion. This section presents one fenestral division to Second Street on the south, one division to the corner, and three divisions to Lincoln Avenue on the east. Retained in these spaces are interior fittings that include baseboards, window frames, and several ornate door frames. Some original hardware is intact, and there are three impressive light fixtures suspended by brass chains. North of the main entrance is a brick vault measuring seven by twelve feet. A similar vault is directly below in the basement level. An especially attractive interior feature is a leaded glass window in the hall of the second floor. Measuring four feet wide and five feet high, its central pattern consists of a C encircling a B—these letters representing Clarke and Buchanan, a company which owned the building and occupied most of it between 1906-31.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Nebraska Loan and Trust Company Building, commonly known as the Clarke-Buchanan Building, is historically significant to Nebraska through its having been the headquarters of two financial institutions that augmented commercial, land, and other types of development in the south-central and western regions of the state. Architecturally, the building is a fine example of the High Victorian Italianate style as employed in commercial buildings. Its exterior is in a good state of preservation and the structure serves as a key corner edifice in the business district of Hastings.

Constructed between 1883-84, the building was erected as office and rental spaces for the Nebraska Loan and Trust Company, a business organized in 1882 with a capital stock of \$100,000. This company was mainly concerned with loaning money on first mortgage bonds, but school bonds and municipal securities were concerns also, and the company handled a great amount of money for capitalists in the East. When the corner building at Second and Lincoln was erected, Nebraska Loan and Trust's stock had increased to \$500,000, and by 1887 the company employed seventeen clerks in the headquarters, had sixty-four representatives throughout the state, and dealt with between 400-500 correspondents in the East (The Daily Gazette-Journal, Hastings, Imperial Edition, March, 1887). Company activities took place in the building's central section; the first level of the two sections at each end were rented as retail spaces and floors above these were rented as offices.

The Nebraska Loan and Trust was headed by prominent citizens of Hastings, and the community was most receptive to the company. In 1887 the local <u>Daily Gazette-Journal</u> declared:

The company has been of incalculable benefit to the prosperity of the city of Hastings. It has been instrumental in bringing many persons and enterprises to this city...With such an institution in our midst, it matters not what the effect of troublous times may be on the money market of this or any other section of the country... The building ... is one of the handsomest blocks in the city, being in point of architectural detail and finish second to none (Imperial Edition, March, 1887).

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For over two decades the Nebraska Loan and Trust prospered, and its contributions to Nebraska's economic situation enabled settlement and growth to occur in Nebraska and in portions of neighboring states. Early in 1906, however, the Loan and Trust made a voluntary liquidation, "an action brought about through the placing of loans on western Nebraska and Kansas lands situated in the arid regions which had become a burden" (Dorothy Creigh, Adams County: The Story, p. 885).

Succeeding the Loan and Trust was the Clarke-Buchanan Company which had organized in 1903. For a quarter of a century, the Clarke-Buchanan Company conducted a loaning business in the same building, enabling further development in the region and state to occur. But the Great Depression was a severe blow and on October 1, 1931, this company was placed in the hands of the receivers, "an action brought about voluntarily because of stringent financial conditions..., the entire resources of the company being invested in Nebraska farm mortgages" (Creigh, p. 152).

The design of the Nebraska Loan and Trust Company Building is assumed to have been taken from a pattern book: two similar buildings also erected in the 1880s formerly occupied key corner situations in downtown Hastings. Demolished at different dates, these buildings included; the Kerr Opera House on the southeast corner of Second and Lincoln, and the First National Bank on the northwest corner of First and Hastings. Like the Nebraska Loan and Trust Building, they were of brick construction with a good amount of stone trim, and they had beveled corner walls and emphatic pressed-metal parapets.

Thus, the Nebraska Loan and Trust Company Building is the sole survivor of three similar 1880s structures which distinguished downtown Hastings. Stylistically, it conforms to no major American architectural movement and can be termed High Victorian Italianate at best. The busy exterior was undoubtedly considered opulent by Hastings residents in the nineteenth century. Significantly, the building retains sufficient integrity to convey a strong impression of the era in which it was constructed. Despite the repositioning of its principal entrance, the loss of cornice projections, and the deformation of cast-iron shopfronts, it is the most viable commercial building remaining from the 1880s in a community of 23,580.
