DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building is a combination passenger and freight depot constructed in 1911. The single story wooden building is sheathed in horizontal siding and is capped with a bellcast hipped roof. The west end is an open waiting area under a portico supported by Doric columns; the ticket office and interior waiting room is reached through this section. A small gable projects from the roofline on the south side of the building, extending over a slanted bay window facing the area formerly occupied by tracks. The east end of the building was the freight area; this section has seen modernized for use as a nursery office. The major change in this section is the addition of vertical siding and new aluminum frame windows. This modernization occupies only a small portion of the building and does not detract from the overall appearance and character of the depot. Original windows and doors remain throughout the remainder of the building.

The major change in the setting occurred with the removal of the railroad tracks in 1951, and the subsequent conversion of the grounds for use as a nursery. A low wooden fence and landscaping have been added around the nursery office section, and the area formerly occupied by the tracks is used for storage of plants in metal nursery containers.

Overall, the integrity of the building is high and still conveys a strong historical feeling. The depot remains a good example of its type and period, and is one of the local community's few remaining historical structures.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Yorba Linda depot is one of the last surviving structures associated with the nation's largest suburban electric transportation system, the Pacific Electric Railway. Only a few depots from this vast system still exist; the Yorba Linda depot is an intact example of the combination passenger and freight facilities constructed by the railroad in smaller communities throughout the Los Angeles Basin in the early 20th century. It was important as a focal point for transportation and rail commerce in the local community, and provided convenient rail access to the major metropolitan areas to the west. The building remains as one of the few historic structures in this area of rapid suburban growth.

The Yorba Linda depot was constructed in 1911 when Pacific Electric Railway extended its Whittier line into the local area. The structure combined freight and passenger operations under one roof, and was a typical design used by Pacific Electric--similar depots were built at La Habra, Glendora, Covina and Watts. Today, few depots remain from this system which was once one of the major factors contributing the the growth and development of Southern California.

When in use by the interurban electric railway system, the depot was a central point of activity in Yorba Linda. The red cars made nine daily runs to Los Angeles from the depot. Passenger service continued until January, 1938, when the advent of improved highways and increased use of the private automobile reduced ridership, making continued operation of passenger service economically infeasible. The rails along the line were used for freight movement until 1951, when they were removed.

The Yorba Linda Pacific Electric depot remains as one of the community's last tangible links with its past. Today the old depot serves as commercial offices, but faces an uncertain future with developmental pressure threatening the property.
