Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Milpitas Grammar School was built in 1916 in the Neoclassical style, constructed of wood, with stucco siding and is one-story. The exterior is painted light beige with all trim painted off-white. The building is square in shape with a central courtyard surrounded by classrooms. The facility is approximately 6,000 square feet. Except for interior changes the school is in original condition.

West elevation:

- wide concrete steps lead to the centrally located front double doors which are topped with a pediment
- · the front facade has a pedimented portico supported by four Ionic columns
- the raking cornice has dentils, as does the cornicing above the column and over the front doors
- the front doors are flanked by two multi-paned windows topped with cornices, and two single paned sash windows on either side
- the front facade is also flanked by symmetrical bays, each with four multipane windows and lentils supported by brackets
- the front is landscaped with large and small trees, grass and small shubbery

Central elevation:

- the brick courtyard is square in shape surrounded by a concrete walkway leading to the various classrooms
- landscaped with trees and barrel planter boxes
- the courtyard is surrounded by four classrooms, two offices and one multipurpose room
- the twelve courtyard columns surrounding the courtyard area, have been reconstructed to the original style

West and south elevations:

 this utilitarian elevation has sash windows and no other architectural significance

North elevation:

- this utilitarian elevation has sash windows and no other architectural significance
- the north elevation is landscaped with small shrubs
- a parking lot for 50 cars is located north of the facility

Interior significance:

- the multi-purpose room is equipped with a raised-stage which has the original carved proscenium
- all other classrooms and offices are functional, with no significant architectural features

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

In the year 1855, the first school was organized and the building was completed in 1856. The school district was formed in 1860 and began receiving state funding. The district included Milpitas and Alviso residents. This facility was erected on Old Oakland Road, the main thoroughfare in Milpitas. Unfortunately, no information on the architecht or builder is available.

The original school was destroyed by fire in 1912 and the present facility was constructed and opened in 1916. This remained a grammar school site until 1956 when the school district closed the school moving students to a larger school. From 1956 to 1969, the Milpitas Grammar School then served as City Hall. The grammar school has also housed the library, chamber of commerce, police department, and recreation department and now serves as a senior center.


For 100 years, this site was dedicated to education and was one of the focal points in the community. The Grammar School is the oldest surviving school building in Milpitas. The facility is also the only Neoclassical public building in Milpitas, and is an outstanding example of that architectural style.

The building with its distinctive ornamentation and detailing reflects the community's aspirations and pride during the beginning of the Twentieth Century. The community's pride and responsibility to its citizens is exhibited in its building a large and prominent school to accommodate anticipated population growth.

Although the Milpitas Grammar School continued to be significant into more recent times, the period of significance has arbitrarily been ended at 1943, fifty years ago.
