Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Territorial Commercial District of Chouteau is comprised of three commercial buildings all constructed in 1903. Sharing common walls, they all have red brick finishes, flat roofs, and parapets. The district is bounded by Main Street on the south, Railroad Street on the east, town water tower and open space to the rear, and an alley on the west. The three buildings are located in Block 15 of the original townsite of Chouteau which retains the scale and density in the downtown area that it possessed when the buildings were constructed. Although some of the windows and doors have been replaced and some of the brickwork has been painted, the basic integrity of the district's buildings has been preserved. The facade and east side storefronts are set back equidistant from the sidewalks. The district reflects the small town commercial style of architecture prevalent in the Midwest around the turn of the century. As a forerunner to the Chicago Commercial style, the three buildings feature two-story pilasters separating store fronts and accentuating corners, cornices of moderate projection, and brickwork friezes below second story cornices. A focal point of small town commercial buildings were cutaway entries on the corner of buildings which is used on the southeast corner of the Gray and Atkins Merchantile Store (No. 1 on Sketch Map). Additional features include the use of semielliptical, round, and segmental arches over door and window openings. Large display windows dominate first floor fenestration, whereas second floor windows are single 1/1 double-hung sash types of rectangular shape. With no intrusions, the nominated district retains the same overall scale, proportion, and environmental setting as when it was constructed approximately 80 years ago.

Buildings contributing to the character of the district:

- 1. <u>Gray and Atkins Merchantile Store</u> (1903): 2-stories, red brick finish with native stone base on facade and east side, cutaway entry on southeast corner, 2-story pilasters separate store fronts and accentuate corners, semielliptical and round arches over door and some window openings in first floor, segmental arches over window openings in second floor, moderately projecting cornice, brickwork frieze (Photo Nos. 1-5 and No. 1 on sketch map).
- 2. <u>Will Crockett's General Store</u> (1903): 1-story, red brick, flat roof, brickwork frieze, pilasters separating store fronts (Photo Nos 1-2 and No2 on sketch map).
- 3. <u>Griffin's Grocery and Chowteau Cafe</u> (1903): 2-stories, red brick, moderately projecting cornice, 2-story pilasters separating store fronts and accentuating corners, brickwork frieze, semielliptical arches over window openings on west side (Photo Nos. 7-8 and No. 3 on sketch map).

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Territorial Commercial District of Chouteauis both historically and architecturally significant because it: (1) one of the oldest commercial districts in northeastern Oklahoma having been constructed in 1903 during the Indian Territorial Period, and (2) represents one of the best examples of small town Midwestern Commercial style of architecture still intact in northeastern Oklahoma.

Chouteau is one of the oldest towns in Oklahoma having been founded in 1871 when it was a part of the Cherokee Nation, Indian Territory. Because of the French fur trading operations in the early 1800s in the area around Chouteau the town was named in honor of Jean Pierre Chouteauof the ChouteauFur Trading Company of St. Louis which had trading posts along the Grand River of northeastern Oklahoma. Chouteau began as one of the principal railway centers in the Cherokee Nation because the first railroad in Oklahoma, the Missouri, Kansas, and Texas, laid tracks through the area in 1871. Because of its importance as a freight and passenger center, Chouteau soon developed commercial services to serve the needs of the surrounding community. In addition to its significance as a rail center, Chouteau became a rural market center for the farmers

living in the vicinity of the town. The agricultural-oriented area likewise needed goods and services for the rural residents living in the locale. Cotton was the major crop and Chouteaubecame a major processing and exporting center for cotton producers in the area.

As a result of the necessity for goods and services, a well-developed commercial district emerged in Chouteau The original wood frame buildings constructed when the town was founded were destryoed by fire ca. 1900, however, the merchants quickly erected a new, more permanent business district constructed of red brick materials in 1903.

Gray and Atkins Mercantile Store (No. 1 on sketch map) was the first business of its type in Chouteau. The two-story building has served the community as a multipurpose commercial structure during its 80 year history. As one long-term resident recalled, that building has housed businesses which sold goods ranging from "baby bottles to coffins". Prior to World War II, a section of the building's first floor served as the United States Post Office for Chouteau and the second floor provided office space for the local telephone exchange services. The Chouteau Drug currently occupies the first floor of the front half of the building and the rear part of the first floor houses a loan office, teen parlor, and recreation center. The second floor, which once provided office space for physicians and attorneys, is presently used as sleeping rooms.

Will Crockett's General Store (No. 2 on sketch map) has also housed a variety of businesses. Since 1907 Crockett's Land Company has held office space in the one story structure. Following Crockett's General Store were a host of business occupants including a dress shop, real estate office, an insurance agency, and Oklahoma Tire and Supply Company (OTASCO).

The Griffin's Grocery and ChouteauCafe Building (No. 3 on sketch map) has likewise been a multi-purpose commercial structure. Other first floor occupants have included a drug store, furniture store, and jewelry store. Current businesses include an insurance agency and real estate office. During its early history, the second floor of the building was used for professional office space, however in recent years, local organizations have used it for meeting rooms.

The three buildings in the ChouteauTerritorial Commercial District provide an excellent example of the architectural style used in small Midwestern towns around the turn of the century. Characteristic of this design is the cutaway entry on the southeast corner of the Gray and Atkins Building. As a forerunner to the Chicago Commercial School, the buildings feature two-story pilasters extending above roof lines, which separate store fronts and accentuate corners; moderately projecting cornices on the upper termination of facades; and brickwork friezes. First floor facades are filled with numerous openings, especially large display windows. Second floor fenestration consists of single 1/1 double-hung sash windows of rectangular shape topped with segmental arches. Semielliptical and round arches are used over first floor openings.

Although occupancy has varied and ownership has changed, the Territorial Commercial District has continuously served the commercial needs of Chouteauand surrounding area for approximately 80 years.
