Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

"End of the Trail" is a bronze cast statue located in Shaler Park in the city of Waupun. The statue rests on a mound of limestone, facing south. It is about 15 feet tall, and some 2 1/2 times lifesize, depicting an Indian mounted on a horse. The Indian is clothed in the remnants of a blanket and carries a spear. The artist has arranged the posture and appearance of both the horse and the Indian in a manner that depicts exhaustion and despair. In this manner he portrays his theme of tragedy. The statue and the park are both well kept and in good shape, and the bronze has a welldeveloped patina.

### 8. Significance



#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

A gift to the city of Waupun, James Earle Fraser's "End of the Trail" was the first masterpiece in this artist's great career as a sculptor. The haunting reminder of the trials and tragedies that pursued the American Indian throughout the 19th century are brilliantly symbolized in the image evoked by this one piece of work, and the statue is unlikely ever to have a rival in depicting the recent plight of its subject.

#### Sculpture

Raised in the Dakota Territory, James Earle Fraser (1876-1953) was able to impart personal observations to his "End of the Trail," for as a boy he lived near a settlement of Sioux Indians and was well acquainted with their history. He created a model of the statue as early as 1893, and won with it a \$1000 award at the <u>Ecole des Beaux Arts</u> in Paris, winning also a chance to study for three years with some of the finest French sculptors. In 1915, Fraser created a large reproduction of his model, using a Seneca chief as a model to obtain greater detail and clarity (interestingly, this same Seneca, Chief Johnny Big Tree, was also Fraser's model for the design of the Indian Head, or Buffalo, nickel). This statue was a part of the San Francisco World Fair in 1915, and won there the gold medal for American sculpture. Fraser subsequently produced numerous other famous sculptings, many of them statues of American statesmen for display at state and federal public buildings.<sup>3</sup>

One of the thousands who saw "End of the Trail" at San Francisco in 1915 was Wisconsinite Clarence Addison Shaler, a self-made millionaire with a great interest in sculpture. Throughout his life Shaler collected sculpture, donating many of these works to groups or communities in Wisconsin. In 1923, for example, he gave a Lorado Taft sculpture, "Recording Angel" (NRHP, 7/15/74) to the city of Waupun, where he lived. Three years later, Shaler met Fraser and commissioned the now-famous artist to create a copy of "End of the Trail." The bronze cast copy was completed by the sculptor in 1929, and Shaler donated this work, too, to the city of Waupun. Fraser was happy to have his work displayed in this manner, for he felt that it was "fitting that in Wisconsin, where the Indian made one of his last stands...I could offer this slight tribute to his memory." At the dedication of the statue, the mayor of Waupun noted that the term 'waupun' was an Indian word meaning 'dawn of the day,' and noted that the placing of "End of the Trail" at this city aptly denoted "the beginning and the end of the Indian's day" in America.<sup>4</sup>

At this time, with the original "End of the Trail" in the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma,<sup>5</sup> the bronze copy in Waupun is believed to be the only Fraser statue in Wisconsin. It is located in a small park, and through the years has attracted visitors from across the state to view this tribute to a bygone era.
