Description

The Hotel Covell is a four story building constructed of steel and reinforced concrete, faced with brick laid in Flemish bond. The building is a restrained example of Beaux Arts Classicism with Italian Renaissance influences. The first portion of the building, fronting on J Street, was constructed in 1924. The second section of the hotel, completed in 1928, faces 11th Street and abuts the original rectangular segment of the building creating an L-shape The hotel is located in the downtown business and plan. commercial district of the City of Modesto. Although currently vacant, the Covell was a focal point of the community from the time it opened to the public in 1924 until it closed in the 1980s. In 1924, the building consisted of 70 quest rooms on the upper three floors, with a mezzanine, a lobby, eight retail stores and a theater on the ground level and a full basement below. The 1928 annex provided an additional 50 rooms bringing the total number of quest rooms to 120. The dimensions of the ground level are approximately 142 feet by 175 feet. The basement is similar in size.

Early photographs of the building are too indistinct to provide an accurate description of the original street level store fronts. All of the original eight retail stores were substantially altered during remodeling projects undertaken in the early to mid 1950s. The ground level store fronts presently consist of expansive plate glass windows with aluminum framed doors and modern masonry extending from the sidewalk to the bottom of the display windows. With the exception of these modifications to the street level facade, the building is essentially intact and appears as it did when construction was completed in 1928. A metal canopy projects over the public sidewalk (above the store fronts and theater) along the J Street facade. The canopy continues around the east corner of the building, extending over the 11th Street entrance and then terminates. The canopy is arched over both the J Street and 11th Street entrances. Original plans show anarched canopy over the theater entrance as well, however, this is no longer in

existence. Above the canopy is a series of 18 transoms which provide light and ventilation to the mezzanine level. The bottom line of the transoms is defined by the arch of the canopy.

A belt course consisting of a dentil band below a projecting molding separates the first and second stories along the J Street and 11th Street elevations. The brick walls of the upper three stories are now painted a pale ivory-yellow. A paint analysis has not been done, however, photographic evidence indicates that the building was probably painted a pale color originally. The walls of the upper three stories are pierced by symmetrically spaced wood framed, one-overone double hung sash windows. Each window is approximately 4 feet wide and 6 feet high and is capped by a flat arch composed of vertical bricks with a prominent scroll key console.

The building is crowned by an elaborate projecting cornice featuring finely detailed medallions, pendants and a dentil band. All of the applied decoration is of plaster. Above the cornice is a parapet wallwhich masks the low pitched hip roof of the hotel and the barrel roof covering the theater portion of the building.

Substantial steel fire escapes connecting the upper three floors are located on the 11th Street facade and on the alley (southwest) side of the building.

Although the street level store fronts suffer from a 1950s era remodeling, the upper three stories of the Hotel Covell are very much intact on both the J Street and 11th Street elevations. The original structural system, massing, proportions and pattern of fenestration are still in place. The three upper stories also retain key exterior surface materials as well as ornamental details dating from the hotel's period of historic significance, 1924-1928. Many interior features, particularly in the lobby area and on the

mezzanine level, are also intact. Among these features are the handsome pillars and pilasters with their richly ornamented capitals, in addition to a number of decorative plaster medallions and corbels as well as the fine oak wainscoting, staircases and much of the original terraza floor.

Today the interior space of the first floor is divided into retail shops with entrances to the main lobby. The lobby features a lofty ceiling, approximately 18 feet high, accented by crown moldings and two prominent skylights framed by decorative wood trim. Other notable interior details include massive square pillars and pilasters with recessed plaster panels and decorative capitals. Oak wainscoting surrounds the lobby and two handsome staircases with turned oak balusters and molded handrails lead from the ground level to the mezzanine and upper floors. The mezzanine is enriched by a number of ornamental plaster medallions and corbels.

Although some of the hardwood flooring and high baseboards as well as a smattering of plumbing and lighting fixtures remain, most of the original interior features on the upper three levels of the building are either missing or have significantly deteriorated.

The floor of the lobby was originally paved with white hexagonal tiles framed by colorful marble terraza borders. Some of the original lobby floor remains as well as the floor of the recessed 11th Street entrance which contains the words "Hotel Covell" spelled out in small square black tiles surrounded by the same ornamental borders as in the lobby. If a similar floor existed at the J Street entrance it has been replaced by four inch square red tiles.

The theater, located in the southwest portion of the original hotel building, was refurbished in 1949. Its Art

Moderne style interior which includes a lobby, stage, balcony and 700 theater seats remains substantially intact.

Statement of Significance

The Hotel Covell is significant in the area of architecture as a good vernacular expression of Beaux Arts Classicism and as one of the best surviving examples of the style in the City of Modesto. Since 1924, when the first phase of the building was completed, the Covell has been a prominent architectural feature in Modesto's downtown center.

Beaux Arts elements are displayed in the clearly articulated separation of the ground level from the upper floors of the building as well as in the decorated colossal pilasters, enriched moldings and pronounced cornice. Although the Hotel Covell lacks the grandiose combination of arches and columns, effusive applied decoration and variety of finishes seen in more high style examples in major metropolitan areas, the Covell does illustrate how Beaux Arts Classicism was interpreted in Modesto.

When the Covell officially opened to the public in May of 1924 this stately hotel was proclaimed by the Modesto Herald newspaper to be "a monument of municipal pride." Both the original portion of the building constructed in 1924, fronting on J Street, and the later 11th Street annex, completed in 1928, were designed for owner, George F. Covell, a wealthy Modesto rancher and developer, by A.W. Cornelius, a prominent San Francisco architect, and built by contractors Hansen and Buchen. An article in the Modesto Herald stated that the four story structure of steel, reinforced concrete and brick was "constructed with the sturdiest materials that modern engineering has to offer. It is fireproof and substantial and its appearance materially adds to the attractiveness of Modesto." The article went on to say that this hotel is "the equal or probably the superior in class of construction to any building in Modesto..and one of the finest in California."

In 1929 the Modesto Morning Star newspaper declared the interior of the Hotel Covell to be "a worthy example of

decorations and choice of artistic and elegant furnishings." The bedrooms were papered with imported English wallpaper which "blended harmoniously with the carpets and furnishings." The floors of all the hallways and bedrooms were covered with the "finest of Axminster carpets, of a medium dark red shade."

According to the Modesto Herald, "the new hotel boasts furnishing of the best grade" including "ultra comfortable Simons steel furniture." High quality appointments were in evidence throughout the building. The spacious lobby was finished in oak with a marble terraza floor and furnished with overstuffed chairs and lounges, "giving a wonderful appearance and revealing the comfort that awaits those who stay at the Hotel Covell." A mezzanine containing approximately 3200 square feet offered a "comfortable writing and lounging space for the convenience of guests."

All of the latest features were incorporated into the building, including indirect lighting from bracket fixtures, "all shaded so as to shed a soft glow over the room," an automatic steam heating system, and 70 telephones, modern vacuum cleaner system" and hundreds of smaller amenities which afforded the "best to be had in service as well as comfort."

On each of the floors huge steel fire doors were installed to contain any fire ridden portion of the hotel. Hallways connected all parts of the building with exterior steel fire escapes.

Located in the downtown center of the city, the Hotel Covell did much to boost Modesto's economy during its years of operation, years which represented a period of growth and commercial expansion as well as a more sophisticated way of life for Modesto. Although Modesto remains an agricultural community it has grown from 2,000 inhabitants in the 1920s to a population exceeding 175,000. The boundaries of the

city have also expanded from one square mile in 1869 to include over 29 square miles of land. Much of Modesto's early construction was lost in the post World War II decades when many old buildings were replaced with new structures to meet modern needs and codes. The Covell is now surrounded by bland commercial buildings dating from the 1950s and 60s. Once again a proposed expansion of the downtown redevelopment area threatens one of the city's few extant historic buildings, the Covell, a once grand hotel noted for its beauty and elegance.

Even though the expression of Beaux Arts Classicism was somewhat diluted in Modesto compared to more sophisticated examples, it was nevertheless, an important style in the architectural evolution of the city. During the early years of the twentieth century through the late 1920s, a total of six buildings were constructed in downtown Modesto in a variety of classical revival styles. Two of these buildings have been lost to redevelopment and commercial expansion. Of the four remaining buildings which exhibit classical influences, the Hotel Covell is the most fully developed stylistically.

Directly across J Street from the Covell is the Beaty Building, a four story office building faced with brick laid in English bond with ornamental quoins at the corners of the building. Fenestration consists of paired double hung windows with flat brick lintels and a recessed entrance sheathed in black marble. A plaster string course divides the ground level from the upper stories. The building is capped by a cornice featuring an ornamental plaster swag above a dentil band. Retail shops and offices on the street level have been remodeled with a variety of modern materials. Although there are obvious similarities between the Beaty Building and the Hotel Covell, the decorative details of the Covell, such as the belt course and cornice as well as the window surrounds, are more elaborate in the The craftsmanship and execution are also more Covell.

refined and of higher quality in the Covell than in the Beaty Building.

The old Elk's Hall, currently the Teamster's Union Building, located at 1222 I Street, is a three story building, which like the Covell, is faced with brick laid in Flemish bond. The upper two stories and the recessed arched entrance are intact while the remainder of the ground level has been altered with aluminum framed glass doors and windows. The original steel framed windows on the third story are capped by round arches embellished with plaster shields. Flat brick pilasters with foliate plaster capitals flank the windows. Between the first and second stories is a band of plaster panels depicting small shields surrounded by a foliate motif. There is a small dentil band below the third story windows and a low parapet wall at the roof line. Even though the Elk's Hall has many formal elements integrated into its design, the Hotel Covell exhibits a more balanced composition of decorative features. In addition, the organizational separation of the various parts of the building is more clearly articulated in the Covell than in the Elk's Hall.

The Old Telephone Building at 1012 11th Street is a three story office building faced with red brick in Flemish bond. The wood framed windows are topped by flat arches with keystones. An entrance vestibule at the right front corner of the building features classical molded trim and consoles supporting a cornice with flat modillions. A smooth plaster water table extends from the ground level to the bottom of the first floor window sills. A string course with a Greek key design and a band of small dentils separates the second and third stories. Below the parapet is a classical cornice with flat modillions, bed molding and dentils. While the Old Telephone Building displays a number of classical elements, the studied formalism has neither the

variety nor the elaboration of ornamental detail seen in the Hotel Covell.

The Covell was acclaimed as one of the finest hotels of its era, and today it still reflects many significant aspects of its time and place. The overall integrity of the Hotel Covell is substantially intact. The building retains a majority of the elements that illustrate its style including symmetrical elevations and elaborately treated windows as well as the bold cornice with its finely detailed ornament and the crisply drawn belt course separating the ground floor from the upper stories. All of these features are fully integrated into the lines and massing of the building creating a cohesive whole.

While Beaux Arts Classicism was not a prevalent style in Modesto, surviving examples are now extremely rare and the Covell is one of the best of the few that remain. This handsome old building is a promising candidate for adaptive use. The Hotel Covell could function well in the future providing a tangible link with Modesto's past and serving as the cornerstone of downtown revitalization.
