

18. Description Originally, the Lewis Nuckols House was a two-story, three-bay, brick structure with brick belt course. The central entrance consisted of two Dutch doors. Corbelled, brick chimneys flank the ends of the gabled structure. Ca. 1868, the windows were lengthened, the semi-octagonal entrance bay was constructed, and paired brackets were added under the cornice. A one-story, kitchen wing with stone fireplace is appended on the west. A stone smokehouse is located northwest of the (over)		35. Organization Kentucky Heritage Commission

History Lewis Nuckols purchased the property on which the house stands from James Lindsay in 1797, and subsequently acquired numerous other tracts, making him one of the more prominent settlers in the area. Nuckols served as road overseer and surveyor in 1796, was later a justice of the peace, and was sheriff of Scott County from 1816-18. Dr. William T. Risque acquired the house in 1868 and made the various changes.		36. Date Sept, 1978

Verbal Boundary Description

Beginning at point A (see U.S.G.S map), the boundary runs northeast for approximately 800 feet to point B, turns southeast for approximately 500 feet to point C, and then turns southwest for approximately 800 feet to point D. The line then turns northwest following the north side of U.S. 421 for approximately 400 feet to the point of origin.
