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North Race Street Residential District

Physical Description

The North Race Street Residential District begins two blocks north of the commercial square. It encompasses two and one half blocks, of North Race Street between Front and Cherry Street. Only the structures which front this street are included. The district is totally residential in nature, with the exception of the northeast corner. A major commercial intrusion occurs here and consequently this lot is excluded. Most of the structures have fairly deep setbacks from the street and are located on heavily tree shaded lots. The range of construction dates within this district is very broad. It begins with the early 1800's (closer to Front Street) and includes mid-20th century buildings as well. Few intrusions are located within this neighborhood, and all are residential in nature.

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Significance

The North Race Street Residential District is a very compact historic neighborhood on the north side of Glasgow. This street contains some of the most architecturally and historically significant structures within the town.

The William T. Bush House, on the northwest corner of North Race and Front Street, is probably the most architecturally important house in Glasgow. It is a fine Federal style building constructed between 1810-15. The house, originally built with a center passage plan, was altered by a Greek Revival addition some years later.<sup>5</sup> (An end chimney was replaced by another entrance). However, this did not compromise the original integrity of the house. The interior details, especially the mantels are beautifully done.

Another structure of importance on Race Street is the Christopher Tompkins house. Tompkins was a very prominent judge from Glasgow. It was in this home that Judge Tompkins taught law students, one of which was Stephen Logan. Logan later went on to become a law partner of Abraham Lincoln's. The main part of the house (the first story) was constructed in 1816, and then some years later (around the mid 1800's) a second story was added.<sup>6</sup>

The North Race Street area is the only intact historic neighborhood on the north side of town. Historically one of the earliest sections of the community, this area is only one block from the location of the large spring which was a major factor in the county seat's location.
