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7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cockrum House is an Italian Villa style structure constructed in 1876. The two story brick structure is located on Oak Street in Oakland City.

The two story main block is square with a one story rectangular section on the north side and a three story square tower attached at a 45 degree angle to the southwest corner. The tower and main block have hip roofs while the rear section has a gable roof. The main block has a large central chimney, and the rear portion has two smaller chimneys.

The main block of the structure has two windows on each floor of each side except the north. These are double-hung windows with two over two lights, limestone sills, and brick segmental arches with corbelling which suggests dentils. The exceptions to this window style are double, round-arched windows set in recessed panels on the third level of the tower and the small square windows on the north side and above the main entrance in the tower. This later window seems to have been altered, perhaps when the porches were added. The main entrance has a rectangular transom inscribed with "W.M. Cockrum."

The Italian Villa style is indicated by the square tower, round and segmental arched windows, and boxed cornice with dentils and double brackets.

In the late nineteenth century a one-story open porch with wooden pillars was added to the south and east sides. A porch was also added to the west side of the rear section. In recent years the wooden pillars were replaced with iron decorative supports. Earlier in this century, the west porch was enclosed so that the exterior now has French doors and casement windows.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The William Cockrum House is important for its architecture and historical associations. The structure is important locally as a representative of the Italian Villa style of architecture. The fact that the tower is attached at an angle to the main block makes the Cockrum House unusual. According to family tradition, Cockrum designed the structure, using pattern books as a guide. The treatment of the tower, the brick corbelling over the windows, and central chimney lends credence to this account since the style seems to have vernacular touches.

The Cockrum family was very important to the development of Oakland City. James W. Cockrum migrated to Gibson County, Indiana, from North Carolina in 1816. The elder Cockrum and Warrick Hargrove platted Oakland City in 1856. Cockrum was involved in the cotton trade, owned several steamboats and a number of flatboats, and farmed. In addition to his successful business activities, Cockrum and his sons championed a number of causes. They were active in the anti-slavery Underground Railroad, maintaining a stop at their farm and participating in raids against slave catchers. More than a half a century later William Cockrum recorded his experiences in The Underground Railroad.

Another cause which the Cockrums' promoted was education for all people. They helped to found Oakland City College and donated generously to it. The Cockrum family also was noted for their opposition to the liquor interests; they were able to keep Oakland City dry until 1881.

William B. Cockrum was born in 1837 and joined his brother as a partner in a mercantile concern that dealt primarily in pork and leaf tobacco. With the coming of the Civil War in 1861, he joined the 42nd Regiment of the Indiana Volunteer Infantry and rose to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. After being severely wounded during the Battle of Chikamauga, he was captured and held several minths in Libby Prison until released in a prisoner exchange After the war he was the chairman of the commission which was formed to preserve the Chickamauga Battlefield as a national park.

In the decades after the war, Colonel Cockrum turned to farming and manufacturing barrel stoves while retaining his interest in humanitarian causes. The existing Cockrum House was constructed in 1876 to replace a frame residence which was burned in 1875 by people who favored bringing saloons to Oakland City. When Cockrum died in 1924, he left the house to his children in a life estate, and in 1960 when his last daughter died, the structure was given to Oakland City College. Since 1960 it has been used as the Music and Fine Arts Building.

The Cockrum House is significant for its vernacular representation of the Italian Villa style of architecture and for its historical associations with Colonel William Cockrum.
