DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This Quaker meeting house was built in 1916, to replace a much older wood frame structure, that was also used as an area school.

The meeting house is constructed of clay tile, with exterior walls veneered in brick. The basement area above grade is faced with a brick slightly lighter than that of the structure proper. The main gable is oriented north-south, with an intersecting front gable on the east side. A smaller gable is set asymmetrically at the outer corner of the north and east gable ends. The latter small gable, supported on square brick piers, shelters the main entrance. Behind it rises a short square belltower with crenellated parapet and pairs of elliptical arched openings on each side of the bellchamber. The small gable on the north side covers a secondary entrance and vestibule.

The meeting room or sanctuary is illuminated on north, south and east by larger, segmental arched openings with semi-circular ordered arches, into which are set (in groups of three) 9/1 double hung sash windows flanking a slightly larger 15/1 d.h.s. window, the three grouped beneath a multilight transom. All other window openings are simply rectilinear.

The main entrance consists of a pair of panelled doors, each with a semi-circular light at the top. It opens into a vestibule and stairhall (the sanctuary is a few steps above the level of the entrance) that in turn leads into the meeting room proper. This room occupies most of the main floor area, with leetern and readers' platform located in the SW corner. A room off the east (situated beneath the east gable) was used for additonal seating.

In the basement are a large assembly room, restrooms, classrooms and kitchen. A 1950's addition to the basement provided more classroom space across the west side.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Honey Creek Friends Meeting House is locally significant as an unusual application of the Craftsman style to an ecclesiastical structure. Reflections of this generally residential style are seen in the asymmetrical arrangement of open gables, and in the treatment of the wide eaves with their plain, triangular brackets. Only the crenellated belltower suggests the religious function of the building. This discretion is appropriate in a Quaker church, since the Society of Friends has traditionally eschewed the use of religious iconography in its meeting houses.

The building was erected in 1916, replacing an older (c. 1860) wood frame meeting house. Ernie Moon, a local builder, was responsible for construction. The provenance of the design is unknown, although church records indicate that "two architects from Marshalltown" presented plans for structures costing \$6000 and \$8000 to the building comittee in May, 1916. Of interest in this respect is the Bangor Friends' Church in Marshall County (adjacent to Hardin Co. on the southeast) that also dates from early in the 20th century. In the Bangor church, the Craftsman idiom is very diluted, finding expression principally in the roof shape and eaves treatment of the main block and entrance vestibule -- but the similarities are interesting.

The Honey Creek Monthly Meeting was first organized in 1852, by a group of Friends originally from Yadkin County, N. Carolina. They arrived in Hardin County in 1851, and the preparative meeting, at which the Monthly Meeting was established, took place in the fall of the following year. The first meeting house was a log structure, erected in 1854. It was replaced, after a fire in 1859, with a 32' x 48' building that, with various subsequent additions, was used until 1916. In 1967, the Honey Creek and nearby New Providence Monthly Meetings merged, and a new meeting house for the Honey Creek-New Providence Monthly Meeting was opened in 1973. The 1916 Honey Creek meeting house is now used only for special events.
