

DESCRIPTION	ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Small Greek Revival-style house; rec- tangular in plan, one story high, gable roof, front pedimented portico with full-width porch, rear ell, two interior chimneys; wood-frame construction, sheathed in weather- boards, wood detailing; front facade features central pedimented portico with two square columns, trabeated entry with side and transom lights, flush siding; front windows paired; interior consists of a single room on either side of a central hall plus rear rooms; si- tuated on a level lot next to the creek; grounds feature large trees and open lawn; com- mercial district to north, residences to west andsouth, Rolator Park to east; good condi- tion.

IV. SIGNIFICANCE	N.R. AREA(S) OF SIGNIFICANCE: Architecture, exploration and LEVEL: Local settlement STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecturally, this house is one of a few small Greek Revival-style residences in the Cave Spring multiple-resource area. In terms of its form, arrangement, materials, construction, and details, it is a good example of its style and type. It represents the carpenter/builder tradition of ar- chitecture common to rural parts of the country. In terms of <u>exploration</u> and <u>settlement</u> , this house is significant as representing one of the types of dwellings first built by white settlers after this land was opened to settlement in the 1830s. Its location near the spring was typical of houses built before the gridiron town plan was laid out.
