Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Situated on a landscaped corner lot in the northwestern part of Spearfish, near the campus of Black Hills State University, the Arthur Hewes House is a two-and-one-half story Queen Anne dwelling. Rising from a stone foundation, the large square wood frame building is clad with clapboard siding. It is capped by a symmetrical pyramidal roof, however, an irregular roof line is created by several gabled two-story bays that project from each of the four main facades. Each of the projecting bays feature return eaves that form broken pediments. The centers of the south and east gables are pierced by ornate round windows with keystones. The northwest projecting bay includes a jerkin head configuration. Two brick chimneys rise from the roof line. An open porch sprawls across the front (east) facade of the house. It is capped by a hipped roof supported by smooth lonic columns and dentils. A triangular pediment marks the entrance to the porch. The base of the porch has been filled in with painted concrete blocks. An enclosed second story sun porch with a shed roof projects from the northwest corner of the house. A modern intrusive redwood second story balcony has been added to the sun porch on the south facade. Fenestration is asymmetrical, composed mainly of one-over-one double-hung windows. Large picture windows with rectangular overlights occupy the center of the first floor level of the projecting bays on the east and south facades. Smaller fixed sash windows with vertical lights pierce the center of the second floor level of these bays. The lighted front entrance door is flanked by sidelights and capped by a transom. The floor plan is Irregular with front and rear parlors to the right of the entrance hallway. Interior features include original plaster walls, decorative balustrades, and hardwood floors and trim. The kitchen has been modernized.

Just to the northwest of the house is a gambrel roof wood frame garage (noncontributing) with a side shed addition. It rises from a concrete foundation and is clad with wide clapboard siding.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Arthur Hewes House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good example of the Queen Anne style of architecture as popular in Spearfish, South Dakota, during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the nominated property relates to the following historical context: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, D.2. Urban Development/Residential living.

During the last two decades of the 19th Century, Queen Anne styling dominated domestic building throughout the nation. Influenced by the work of English architect Richard Norman Shaw, Queen Anne houses provided increased comfort and domesticity for single-family households. Prominent aesthetic features of the style include irregularity and asymmetry of facades, Irregular roof lines, multiplicity of siding materials - especially the use of fishscale shingles, and decorative treatments to gable ends, porches, and projecting bays. The front facade is usually divided into uneven squares or planes. Fenestration is always asymmetrical, often consisting of a number of shapes and sizes of windows. Often a tower is incorporated into the design. The influence of Queen Anne architecture continued in south Dakota long after its popularity waned on the east and west coasts. Although greatly simplified from nineteenth Century models, the late examples retained a variety of the characteristic elements of the style. In addition, some elements of the emerging classical revival movement including pediments, dentils, and classical columns, were also often incorporated into house designs. The Arthur Hewes house is a good illustration of the application of these later design elements.

Spearfish, located on the eastern rim of the Black Hills, was founded in 1876 in response to the emerging gold rush. It quickly grew into a vital service community for the area miners and ranchers. In the mid-1880's the city became the home of Black Hills Normal School, now known as Black Hills State University. Arthur Hewes had a general merchandise store in Spearfish from 1903 to at least 1921. No other genealogical or historical information is known about Mr. Hewes.

The period of significance of the nominated property does not extend beyond the date of construction in circa 1905.
