Architectural Statement: A complex roof configuration distinguishes this Victorian Gothic style house. In plan, the design appears quite contained with slight projections on the facade and east elevations. However, in elevation, the irregular massing is emphasized by the variety of roof shapes. The facade consists of a projecting section capped by a steeply pitched gable (decorated with bargeboards and brackets) and a corner tower. The tower is delineated by a slight projection but is fully developed as a separate entity at the roof where it		Historical Statement: Margaret Kershaw owned the property in 1880 (D); however by 1890 Hemlock had purchased the residence. Hemlock moved to Waukesha in 1883, and became a prominent lawyer in the community.

**Architectural Statement:**

is covered by a steep hip roof with flared eaves. Similarly roofed window dormers are set in to the tower roof. A two story bay attached to the east elevation is also surmounted by a steep hip roof which creates the impression of a tower. A jerkin head dormer projects from that roof.

The two stories and attic sheltered by this complex roof is constructed of cream city brick. The tall proportions of the building are accented by slender windows. Brick hood molds above the fenestration are stilted segmental arches with carved stone imposts and keystones. Original windows have been replaced with aluminum sash. Another modification is the replacement of the original porch with a very plain shallow hip roof supported by square posts.

**Architectural Significance:**

Architecturally significant as a representative example of a period of construction, the Hemlock house is a fine example of the Victorian Gothic style. Distinguished by the strong profile, fine ornamentation and masonry construction, the Hemlock house remains as one of the best preserved examples of the style in Waukesha. Comparable examples include the <sup>nominated</sup> Howitt house at 407 N. Grand (WK 1/20), 710-712 N. East Ave. (WK 2/15), 501 Barney St. (WK 38/17) and 507 E. College Ave. (WK 36/7).
