Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Middleton house is a good example of early twentieth century residential design. It combines neoclassical details, including symmetrical arrangement and plain columns, with the ample proportions, large windows and very narrow clapboard-covered porch columns associated with later designs.


Built in 1902-03 according to city directories, interviews and the water meter hook-up date, the porch and window treatment above it are noteworthy. The ample porch, which spans the front of the hipped roof house, has four smooth columns and a simple balus-trade but also clapboard-covered piers at the corners, as if local architect Fritz G. Clausen feared that the columns alone provided insufficient support. Also on the front is a two window dormer having hipped and gabled rooflines and covered with wider clapboard. This dormer unit projects slightly and four brackets seem to hold it. Beneath them are two small rounded windows eccentrically outlined and bracketed as well.

Six mature oaks shade the residential lot. Other houses in the neighborhood are of similar age and proportions, including one built by George Middleton's brother. (Their parents had owned the property and had a house, no longer standing, behind them.) An alley runs along one side and is separated from the property by the original brick wall. George Middleton raised bees near the wall. Also present is a concrete fishpond, now a rock garden, and the garage.

There have been a few changes to the dwelling, most associated with its conversion to a duplex in 1940. Although it has recently been returned to single family status, the second front door dating from 1940 remains as does an enclosed sunporch in the rear. Inside, the front stairs have been enlosed, a kitchen added to the second floor and a bathroom created out of a first floor pantry. The garage, which carried on the form and materials of the house, was enlarged to accomodate three cars, also in 1940.

An ample foyer opens vias French doors onto the living room, which features a fireplace. The dining room has a bay window. What were described as "wood strips give the rooms a Tudor look."

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The house's significance is architectural. Dr. George Middleton lived in the house between 1903 and 1918, when he left to serve in World War I. The house was built on land from his father's estate and George did not receive title to the property until 1915. Dr. Middleton was a general practice doctor and also was Davenport's City Physician, and a "traveling doctor for local industry," including the Rock Island Railroad. The Middletons had no children, and that may explain their sale of the house in 1918 when the doctor joined the Army Medical Corps. Middleton was one of three doctor sons that Dr. William Middleton, a founding member of the State University of Iowa Medical College and a bone specialist, sired.
